## OBITUARY

Edith Zarina Lane was born in Brunswick, Ohio, July 22, 1850; died in Brunswick Sept. 5, 1921, aged 71 years, one month, 14 days.

She was the daughter of Oscar and Almada Root Lane. Her mother died Sept. 12, 1898 and her father died Sept. 4, 1905. She lived in the community where she died practically all her life. The home has been the

home of her grandparents and her father and mother. She grew to love the home she had known from her earliest recollection. It was, indeed, home. She was not rich in a financial sense, but rich in service and true friends. She gave her life to her parents and a brother, John, whom she cared for in his last illness a few years ago. Her nearest relatives living are cousins of which there are a large number. Stricken down suddenly she was taken to the home of Florence Vaughn where everything that love could devise was done for her. Fitting memorial services were conducted at the Methodist church by the pastor, Rev. W. M. Kinsley, and the body was laid in the Brunswick cemetery Sept. 7.

## OBITUARY

Arber Tebbit, Jr. B. 71 Southampton St., Pantonville, London, Apr. 15, 1851, 4 before 8 a. m., registered in Henry St., London. (Item from old family Bible).

Arber Tebbit died at 343 North St., Medina, Ohio, Aug. 30th, 1921. (Sentinel.)

And between the two items man's allotted life of 3 score years and ten was lived.

Arber Tebbit was one of five children born to Arber and Elizabeth Williams Tebbit of London, Eng. His early education was received in a private school in Walworth Rd., London, and then a premium was paid for seven years apprenticeship to learn the trade of cabinetmaker. Young Tebbit had just set up in business for himself when John Finch, a cousin (who will be remembered by old residents of Medina) returned from America and glowingly told of prospects for young men there and it was hurriedly arranged for Arber to accompany his cousin, sailing on the California leaving Glasgow March 29, 1873.

For some time he was employed by the A. I. Root Co. in Medina and has said he was the first man to make the one piece section for honey. Later he worked for Mr. Givers, early builder in Medina, and later went into business for himself, building many homes in Medina.

It will be remembered that Mr. Tebbit constructed the first road pavement in Medina which was on W. Liberty street and constructed of heavy Berea stone.

In 1891 Mr. Tebbit purchased the old Oatman farm and opened a small milk route, introducing to Medina the bottled milk system instead of the old tin can and dipper.

A few years later in company with his son Ben he purchased the ice business of Mr. Shaw and the ice cream business of Harter Bros.

Mr. Tebbit was affiliated with the K. of P. lodge for 25 years and while a member of no church he maintained a simple belief in a Divine Being and lived a square and upright life among his fellow men.

He was possessed of a rare wit that flashed out at unexpected moments and manifested a keen interest in all topics of the day and always showed a clear grasping of any international or national situation that might arise.

During an illness of some years he was tenderly and lovingly cared for by his oldest daughter Elizabeth.

Mr. Tebbit was married Oct. 3rd 1874 to Ella N. Waters and to this union were born four children, the oldest of whom, Grace E., died March 17, 1880. Ella N. Tebbit departed this life Nov. 4, 1883.

Mr. Tebbit was again married to Eliza Miller, Oct. 9th, 1888 who passed on, Sept. 13th, 1907.

Mr. Tebbit is survived by one brother of Shrewsbury, England, and three children, Elizabeth E., and Ber W. of Medina and Mrs. Frank Willis of Kenmore, Ohio.

The funeral services were held at the late residence, 343 North street, Thursday morning, Sept 1st, conducted by Rev. Caulk of the Episcopal church. Interment in Spring Grove.

Mr. Edward Woods of Pennsylvania is visiting relatives here.


