An Ordinance

Closing Ale, Beer and Porter houses between the hours of 9 p. m. and 6 a. m., from Oct. 1st to April 1st, and between the hours of 10 p. m. and 6 a. m. from April 1st to Oct. 1st. Be it ordained by the Council of the Incorporated Village of Wellington that it shall be unlawful for the proprietor or other person having control of any Ale, Beer or Porter house, shop or place in said Village, where Ale, Beer, Porter or Wine is sold and given away to be drunk in or about the place where sold or given away, to keep open such house, shop or place, or other person than themselves or their employees to remain in or to pass into and out of such place between the hours of 9 p. m. and 6 a. m. during the half year between April 1st and Oct. 1st. Any person violating this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than \$10 nor more than \$50, for the first offense, and in any sum not less than \$20 nor more than \$50, for every offense thereafter at the discretion of the Court. This ordinance passed June 4th, 1885, entitled "An Ordinance shutting up saloons after 10 o'clock p. m. is hereby repealed.
