

**The Western Reserve Fair Circuit.**  
The meeting of representatives from neighboring Agricultural Societies, which was called by the Wellington Society to meet here May 4th, was attended by delegates from Medina, Norwalk, New London, Orrville and Wellington. At this meeting it was unanimously resolved to organize an association known as "The Western Reserve Fair Circuit," and that the membership be limited to Agricultural Fair Societies holding fairs in this part of Ohio. Further, "That, Each Fair Society which becomes a member of this Circuit shall be entitled to but one vote in its deliberations and shall pay its proportion of expenses necessary to maintain this organization."  
"That, Its officers shall be a President and Secretary, who shall be elected at its annual meeting in February, for one year."  
The following societies were asked to become members of this Association, to wit: Orrville, New London, Norwalk, Elyria, Medina, Millersburgh and Wellington. The Secretary was instructed to arrange for the admission of other Fair Societies into the Circuit, so that, if possible, a fair belonging to this Circuit should be held on each consecutive week commencing about the middle of August and closing about the middle of October.  
W. V. Ault, of Orrville, was made President and N. Huckins, of Wellington, Secretary of this Association for the balance of this year.  
The Secretary was instructed to send printed copies of the proceedings of this meeting to all societies invited to join it, and to such other societies as may hold their fairs on weeks not occupied by fairs within the circuit. A written notice to the Secretary of the acceptance and adoption of these proceedings by any fair society shall constitute that society a member of this Circuit.

**Council Proceedings.**  
An adjourned meeting of the council convened in the new chamber, Tuesday evening, May 11th. There were present, Mayor W. E. Wean, Clerk R. N. Goodwin, Councilmen Hemenway, Johns, Lang, D. P. and Jas. Sheldon; T. Kirk being out of town. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. A petition was presented, signed by one hundred and twenty-one citizens, praying for the council to prohibit the owners, agents or lessees from using a frame building situated on the north side of Liberty street, near the Bee Line depot, as a storage house for phosphate. A resolution was offered by Mr. D. P. Sheldon and carried, forbidding the building to be used for such purposes after five days, and the Clerk was instructed to inform the parties named, as aforesaid, of same. Darwin Battle, having declined to serve as street commissioner, unless he could be assured a salary of \$500, Mr. Wean Serage was appointed road supervisor or at a salary of \$175 per day for the time actually employed. A sidewalk, six feet wide, was ordered laid on the east side of Main street, commencing at the Northwest corner of A. G. Couch's lot, thence north to north end of park. S. F. Black presented a bill of \$3.00 for table furnished for fire department—referred to committee on finances.
