

THE PRODUCTS OF GENIUS.

A TORONTO man has invented an oven, through which, in the process of baking, fresh air is constantly circulating. Meats baked in it have a delicious flavor.

A TRICYCLE, for printing advertisements on sidewalks, is in use in Paris. The back wheels have broad rims, and these contain the types, which are automatically inked.

A NEW method of spoiling natural scenery for advertising purposes has been devised in Switzerland. Large white and yellow letters, placed on the bottom of the lake of Geneva, are made visible on the surface by refraction.

At a recent meeting of the Balloon society in England Mr. Hiram Maxim referred to the flying machine, and said his experiments were at a standstill, not from any want of faith in the project, but for want of time.

An artificial larynx has been invented by Prof. Stuart, of the University of Sydney, and tried with success on a man who had lost his voice. The mechanism can be regulated so as to make the voice soprano, tenor, contralto, or bass, at will.

PETER COOPER HEWITT, the wealthy son of one of New York's most famous mayors, is a prominent club man and a society leader, but he passes most of his time in perfecting ingenious labor-saving devices. His latest invention is a machine which has greatly simplified glue-making.

PERSONALS FROM EUROPE.

PROF. HUXLEY'S widow has recently been granted a pension of £200.

PRINCE LIXBY of Prussia's year's leave of absence is to be devoted to the study of constitutional history.

DURING the year ended September 3 Kaiser Wilhelm was away from Berlin one hundred and ninety-five days. This is four days better than last year.

QUEEN MARIKE of Hanover, widow of George V. and mother of the duke of Cumberland, has lost the sight of one eye and may lose the other; she is seventy-seven years old.

COUNT DE CASTELLANE and his wife (Anna Gould) gave a grand country fete at the castle of Rochechouart, Indret-Loree, France, recently. Four thousand persons dined and danced in the park.

MR. MARINESCO-BRAGADIR, the Roumanian manufacturer of alcohol, paid in 1894 five hundred and fifty thousand dollars taxes to the government, and is said to be the largest individual taxpayer in the world.

PRINCE HOHENLOHE, the chancellor of Germany, is the possessor of a large estate in Russia, which was inherited by his wife. Alexander III. ordered all foreigners holding real estate in Russia to sell it or become Russians. The present czar has made an exception in favor of Hohenlohe, although most of the property which he owned has been sold.

COMMERCIAL PICKINGS.

THE treasury department has decided that the appraised value of goods is the value of the goods in the foreign port of exportation at the time of shipment.

ABOVE Mannheim the Rhine is to be made navigable as far as Strassburg. As a canal will be inadequate, important changes must be made in the river bed.

It is estimated that thirty per cent. of the iron manufactured by Tennessee is sold outside of the southern states. It is said to be the favorite iron with pipe, plow and stovemakers in the east and north.

OUR consul at Frankfurt, Germany, reports that the beet sugar product of all European countries this year is estimated at 3,015,000 tons, against 4,730,000 tons for the previous year, which was an abnormal yield.

SAN JOSE, Cal., shipped more fruit during the third week of last September than in any other week on record. The total was 4,639,300 pounds. Of this amount 1,415,499 pounds was of canned fruit and 1,969,049 pounds of dried prunes.

QUEEN AMELIE of Portugal is studying medicine.

SIDI MUSTAPHA, eldest son of the bey of Tunis, died recently of diabetes at the age of fifty-nine.

LOBENGULA is reported to be alive, this time by Father Andre, a Catholic missionary at Bonoma, on the Zambesi, who says that the Matabele king is with some thousands of his people in the Manika country near the Kafue river.

LILUOKalani, the deposed queen of Hawaii, had a good many curious characteristics, one of the most pronounced of which was a perfect passion for the collection of rope knots made by sailors of different nationalities who visited her domain.

SULTAN MOHAMMED AOKHA KHAN of Poona is indignant with the earl of Dunmore for maligning his grandfather. In a book on the Pamirs the earl says he granted free passes to Heaven by letters addressed to "My Brother Gabriel." This, the sultan says, is not true, yet the earl persistently refuses to suppress the statement.

ROD AND GUN.

YORK county (Me.) farmers are telling of a snow-white deer that has been seen in that region several times of late.

AN eighty-year-old fisherman of Amesbury, Mass., caught a lobster four feet long and weighing twenty-five pounds at Salisbury Beach a few days ago.

BLACK BEARS are reported to be much more numerous than usual in the Disraeli Swamp region this fall. They are doing much damage among the crops and stock on farms thereabout.

ENGLISH ideas of sport: "Her majesty's buckhounds are expected to commence forest hunting early in October. The red deer intended for sport with the royal hunt will be captured in Windsor park about the end of the present month."

A SCHOOL FOR CRIME.

Youthful Shoplifters in New York Caught to Steal by Women.

New York, Oct. 12.—Agents of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children have unearthed a school for stealing on the East Side and have already made seven arrests, six of the prisoners being children of tender years. The arrests grew out of a charge of attempted blackmail made to the society by a gentleman residing on Fifth avenue, who said that the Fagin of the school, Kate Fitzgerald, had taken advantage of his position in society to try to make him give money to her and her companions. Agents were detailed to investigate the story; he told and they arrested three children in a dry goods store in Eighth avenue, where they were reaping a rich harvest under the very eyes of the store detectives. Agent Watson arrested a well dressed young woman who said she was Madge Kennedy.

Kate Fitzgerald and the Kennedy woman are charged with teaching the children to steal and with sending them out to the big dry goods stores to steal. The two women and the children had a room in the neighborhood of Fourteenth street and Third avenue, where they lived.

MADE BOGUS TICKETS.

Arrest of Two Chicagoans for Defrauding a Street Railway Company.

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—Special Officer O'Keefe, of the Chicago City Railway Company, has placed under arrest two men who have been systematically robbing the company over six months by means of bogus tickets. The names of the men arrested are Robert B. Mather, who has been employed by the company as a conductor almost ten years, and Carl Hollis, an electrician and jeweler. Last August it was discovered that bogus tickets were being circulated and the employes of the company were shadowed systematically.

Mather and Hollis were traced to Indianapolis, where they paid a die cutter for sinking a die for the blank form of the ticket, and when O'Keefe descended upon the two men Thursday night he found them at work with a full printing outfit in a rear room at Mather's home. It is estimated the ticket forgers have secured \$5,000 from their work. A charge of conspiracy to defraud has been placed against the men.

IN HARD LUCK.

Starvation Stares Unfortunate Canal Boatmen in the Face.

ELLENVILLE, N. Y., Oct. 12.—Starvation is staring the canal boatmen in the face. Their 475 boats are tied up all along the line on dry land. Many are empty, but more are filled with coal. For seven weeks not a boat has moved. The men have quartered their horses and mules with farmers, but they have no money to pay for their keep. The boatmen usually make ten trips every season and they receive \$30 a trip. This season they have made only four or five trips. Few of the men have paid for their boats.

The Delaware & Hudson Canal Company sell the boats for \$2,000 and keep \$15 out of each trip until the boats are paid for. The men are so poor now that a committee waited upon the company and obtained \$50 each to help support them this winter. This amount will be charged against the boats.

THROUGH A BRIDGE.

Passenger Train on the Grand Trunk Takes a Drop into a River.

PETERBORO, Ont., Oct. 12.—The passenger train on the Grand Trunk, which left here at 9 o'clock Thursday night, dashed through a lock bridge on the Otonabee river, about a mile out of town, into fifteen feet of water. The bridge had just been opened to allow a steamer to pass through and was in the act of being closed when the train came along and plunged into the draw. The engine dropped and sank almost instantly and the baggage car crashed into it. The passenger car hung half way over the opening. The fireman, baggage man and brakeman escaped by swimming ashore. The remainder of the train hands and eight passengers in the rear coach also escaped, but the latter were badly shaken up and some had to crawl through the car windows.

Miners and Operators Agree.

PITTSBURG, Oct. 12.—The committee of miners and operators appointed to secure a uniformity of rates reported back to the convention yesterday that the rates agreed upon on August 4 should remain in force until December 31, namely 64 cents, where wages are paid in cash and 69 cents where the company stores exist. The committee further decided that all company stores shall be abolished after January 1, 1896. The report was adopted by the convention. Another joint convention of operators and miners will be held December 3 to agree upon mining rates for 1896.

The Sheriff Decides.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Oct. 12.—The Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight situation can be summed up as follows: The governor or will depend entirely upon the sheriff of Garland county. If that official tells the governor that he is powerless to stop the fight and asks for assistance, Gov. Clarke will place the militia at the disposal of the sheriff. If Sheriff Haupt does not call for assistance the governor will do nothing. This line of action is in accordance with all precedents. The statutes of Arkansas plainly say that assistance must be called for by the sheriff before the governor can call out the militia.

He Didn't Trust Banks.

LOCKPORT, N. Y., Oct. 12.—Two masked men entered the house of Calvin Thompson, a wealthy farmer, at Cambria Center, ten miles east of this city, Thursday night, while Thompson was sitting in the dining room with his housekeeper reading. The men chloroformed both and ransacked the house, securing a sum of money said to be nearly \$1,000, which they found in the desk. Since the failure of the Merchants' bank three years ago, in which Thompson was a large depositor, and the flight of ex-Police Justice Freeman with some of his funds, Thompson has kept most of his money in the house.

BISHOPS CHECKED.

Episcopal House of Deputies Refuses to Surrender a Valued Prerogative.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Oct. 8.—The house of deputies of the Episcopal convention yesterday placed itself on record as being unwilling to surrender one of its most valuable prerogatives and practically the only one that enables it to hold the whip hand in preventing the house of bishops from making of itself, if it were so disposed, a literal oligarchy.

But for the fact that it is now recognized that the present debate is but an interchange of opinions between representatives of the various dioceses and that the old constitution is likely to remain the foundation of the church, the refusal of the convention to renege the clause putting into effect within three days all legislation concerning which the bishops had made sign might be fraught with grave consequences to the church. This clause, which was omitted from the new revision, enables the house of bishops to indefinitely kill by failure to act, all matters with which it may not be in accord. The result would be...
