NEWS OF THE WEEK.

Gathered from All Quarters.

WASHINGTON.

The war department has been asked by Gen. Ota for 5,000,000 rounds of ammunition for the army rifle.

On the 14th the navigation bureau of the navy issued a list of vessels of the United States of all kinds, making the surprising showing of 312 craft.

Up to the 13th inst. 5,320 men had been obtained for the ten new volunteer regiments last authorized.

President McKinley is receiving a large number of petitions asking him to request the French government to pardon Dreyfus.

EAST.

At New York City on the 14th the price of beef took another jump.

In addition to the advance made September 1, the American Steel & Wire Co. announces another advance in prices.

At Philadelphia on the 13th nearly 1,700 painters, members of the Amalgamated Journeymen House Painters' association, went on strike.

On the night of the 13th two men were killed and two injured in a collision on the Pittsburgh, Virginia & Charleston railroad near Baird station.

An assignment was made by R. P. Larrabee & Co., proprietors of a large department store at Boston on the 14th.

It is announced that there will be no mass meeting in New York City to protest against the condemnation of Dreyfus.

At Allentown, Pa., Judge Albright has ordered the removal of the bronze tablet on the soldiers' monument in that city.

For the week ended September 15 the business failures in the United States numbered 145, as compared with 174 for the corresponding week of last year.

The subscriptions for the Dewey memorial fund in New York now amount to \$75,000.

New York capitalists have arranged for a combination of chair making plants. About 85 per cent. of all the manufacturers in this country are interested in the union.

The will of Cornelius Vanderbilt will not be probated nor its contents made public until Alfred Vanderbilt, the second son, can reach home.

At New York City the meat combine has made another advance in prices. Pork has almost doubled and veal has advanced 25 per cent.

On the 17th Charles Holmes and wife, colored, of Jordanville, N. J., were killed by a West Jersey railroad train near Collinwood, N. J.

At Philadelphia the master painters are gradually signing the agreement for the new wage schedule of 25 cents an hour and a working day of eight hours.

A combine of granite manufacturers in the Massachusetts territory made famous by "Quincy granite" is proposed.

It is stated by James A. Chambers, president of the American Glass Co., that a window glass combine has been effected.

Because of the Dreyfus verdict the Solebury (Pa.) Farmers' club has decided not to send samples of wheat to the Paris exposition.

WEST AND SOUTH.

A system of wireless telegraphy has been invented by Peter Pearson, an Oklahoma man, which he claims is perfectly successful.

Large prairie fires have been raging for several days on the plains and in the Pan-Handle section of Texas.

At the present time almost all of the New river mining district of West Virginia is idle.

The schooner Mildred E. of San Francisco, left St. Michaels, Alaska, August 1, for Seattle, Wash., and has not since been heard of.

At Crawfordsville, Ind., Prof. Dennis, an aeronaut, attempted a parachute drop at a fair, but met with an accident that is likely to cost him his life.

Fire which broke out in the North block at Lincoln, Neb., on the 16th caused a loss of \$500,000.

The grand jury at Pana, Ill., has indicted 11 coal operators for inciting riot in that city in April last.

FOREIGN.

On the 13th the German Trades Union association adopted a resolution not to exhibit at the Paris exposition.

A German spy has been arrested at La Rochelle sur Meuse, France.

Dispatches from Kalisch, a town in Russian Poland, say that 23 persons were rushed to death in a panic in a synagogue there, caused by the upsetting of a lamp.

The war department has abandoned the steamship Morgan City to her owners. She lies in the inland sea below Nagasaki, Japan.

It is reported that Great Britain and Portugal are about to sign a convention by which the latter leases to the former territory and stations in Portuguese East Africa.

An explosion occurred in a coal mine at Bedan, Prussia, on the 16th and nine men were suffocated.

LATER.

Judge R. J. Peters, aged 94, died at his home in Mt. Sterling, Ky., on the 18th, as the result of an attack of grip.

Thirteen warships, nine revenue cutters and five torpedo boats will welcome the Olympia when it arrives in New York harbor.

R. F. McClannin, a well known actor, fell dead at the supper table of a hotel in Hartford, Conn., on the 18th, aged 65 years.

Gov. Roosevelt has issued a proclamation setting apart Friday and Saturday, September 29 and 30, as holidays to be observed throughout New York state.

Almost the entire business section of Farnham, N. Y., was wiped out of existence by a fire which broke out in Louis Schwert's barn on the 18th.

The ship George Stetson, of Bath, Me., has been burned at Loo Choo, China. No lives were lost.

The formation of the Tampa, Fla., cigar syndicate has been completed. Officers will be chosen at a meeting to be held in New York within a few days.
