The Jones Non-Partisan movement is, therefore, officially not a party, and accordingly it cannot use a ballot device on the ticket. Voters, however, will be guided by words NON-PARTISAN TICKET. The Jones column will appear as annexed cut after the voter has put his cross opposite Jones' name.

When two or three, ten or twenty, or any number of self-appointed persons assemble and assume the right to select a list of names to be voted for as delegates to "make a slate," or to "issue a call" for a caucus or a convention, they, by that act, violate a fundamental principle of human liberty, the right of the people to govern themselves, to "make their own slates," and to select their own delegates. All such assemblies assume the "divine right of kings," and this hereby must be abandoned before we can be a self-governing people. The political boss is our form of king, and he is an absolute necessity of the party system. The fact that a party is organized for a moral purpose does not affect the principle. The very idea of a political party is based on the assumption that the masses of the people cannot govern themselves, and the self-appointed persons who "make up the slates," call the caucuses, etc., are the kings who are always on hand to do it for them. I deny this principle in toto and assert the divine right of the people to govern themselves and to do it now. No political party to-day advocates this right, nor can any do so; it is the right of the people to do without parties and to begin now.

THE PLATFORM.

The platform, or declaration of principles, on which I shall make the campaign is briefly as follows:

1. Equality of opportunity for all. All men have an equal right to a place on the earth. It is the duty of every patriot to see that this right is guaranteed to every man. The steps necessary to attain this right, for which I stand, are:

1st. Self-government through the abolition of political parties; a, direct nomination of candidates by the people; b, direct making of laws by the people.

2d. Public ownership of all public utilities. The extension of the principle now operating in the public ownership of the post office, to the operation of mines, highways, steam and electric railroads, telegraphs, telephones and water and lighting plants.

3d. Union wages, hours and conditions, or better, for skilled labor, and an eight-hour day, with a living wage, for unskilled labor, on all public work.

4th. Abolition of the contract system, that glaring evil of the competitive system, on all public work, and the substitution of direct employment. Immediate cessation of the present system of exploiting prison labor for the benefit of profit-mongers and to the injury of free labor.

5th. It is the imperative duty of the state legislature to deal with the question of unemployment, to the end that provision may immediately be made that no citizen of Ohio who is willing to work shall be driven into pauperism, crime or insanity, for want of work.

MORALITY, NOT MONEY.

It is well that it is so; our campaign is for a moral purpose, and morality cannot be purchased. The cause is the cause of humanity. Claiming no creed but love, and no party but the people, whose I am and whom I serve, I solemnly pledge to them and to this cause all that I am and all that I have; and I now ask all those who share with me these conceptions of human rights to work for this cause until Equality shall be realized under this government, "conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal."

The platform in the above proclamation is practically the same as that on which Mayor Jones stood while a candidate for mayor of Toledo last spring. At that election the vote was as follows:

- Jones, Independent. 16,773
- Russell, Republican. 4,266
- Dowling, Democrat. 3,148

Total 24,187
Mayor Jones carried every ward, every precinct but one, and received 70 per cent. of all the votes cast.

One thing is pretty certain—he got the votes. As near as we can figure it out Jones got the German, the Swiss, the French, the English, the Poles, the Hungarians, the Methodists, Baptists, Presbyterians, Catholics and A. P. A.'s, organized labor and labor that isn't organized, the republicans, the democrats, the brewers and the saloonkeepers.

As for Mayor Jones, the vote indicates that the people of Toledo have confidence in him and that they do not believe he can be used as a catspaw by the political tricksters who hung onto his coat-tails in this campaign. His obligation is to the people, not to any of the politicians and the vote is a manifestation of confidence in his personality than an endorsement of all his political ideas. It is certainly a wonderful endorsement, one of the most remarkable any man ever got in any city.

Over five weeks will remain in which to make converts, and there are those already prophesying that the state is to witness an example on a large scale of what occurred in Toledo last spring. The Jones petitions are signed by men of all classes. Workingmen, manufacturers, merchants, lawyers, doctors and ministers are all joining in the great revolt now on in Ohio against the tyranny of political bosses and the corruption of machine politics.—Columbus Citizen (McLean).

Neither at this time nor since had there been the slightest stigma upon either the public or private character of Governor Bushnell. Called to his office by a large majority of the people of his state, he was renominated by the republicans without opposition and is now serving his second term in the gubernatorial chair. But in the last campaign for the election of a United States senator from Ohio, Mr. Bushnell did not bow to the dictum of the machine, nor did he approve of the methods by which it sought to thwart the will of the people of the state. Mr. Dick represented the machine, and in his feeling of resentment at the independence manifested by the governor of the people, Nash wrote his ever memorable letter.
