We return thanks to the boys for a beautiful serenade at our residence before they departed for their home. HORSES STOLEN.—Commissioner Yarnell had his team of horses stolen while they were hitched in Napoleon on the 4th.

Upon learning his loss pursuit was at once made, and the guilty party was overhauled at Maumee and brought back to Napoleon Tuesday evening. The thief proves to be one Fred. Market, a German who had been working for the Meyerholtz Bros.

He had traded one of the horses to a man in Texas for a horse and \$7 in money; the other animal he had with him when captured. Market had a hearing yesterday afternoon, when he was bound over to the Court of Common Pleas for horse-stealing.

The town was crowded with people on the 4th, and while the terrible news from Washington marred the pleasures of the National holiday among a large class of American citizens, the vast crowd was busy surging hither and thither, eager to see what was to be seen and catch up and enjoy any and all of the pleasures and amusements of the day, regardless of the black cloud that was hanging over the nation.

The exercises of the day as they appeared upon the programme were gone through with, and were quite interesting. The oration by Mr. Hubbard was a fine effort, and was listened to with marked attention. In the evening a large crowd witnessed the display of fireworks.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.—A young son of Jerry Glass, of the South side, a lad about 12 years of age, while playing with a toy pistol on the morning of the 4th, shot himself in the abdomen. It seems the little fellow had loaded the pistol with a bullet which he had cut down to the size of the barrel, and while in the act of putting the bullet in the hammer snapped and the pistol was discharged, the ball entering his abdomen on the right side.

Dr. Harrison was called, and did all that was necessary for the boy, but the ball was not found. We understand the Dr. pronounces the wound serious, but not necessarily fatal. At last accounts young Glass was very low.

SERIOUS QUARREL.—Two young men got into a quarrel early Sabbath morning last, at about 2 o'clock, which may prove fatal to one of them, or at least disfigure him for life. The particulars as near as we can learn them are as follows: The young men quarreled over the possession of a hat, when one of them, Wm. Spangler, struck the other, Wm. Hall, a blow in the face with a hatchet or some other sharp instrument, cutting through the nose, severing the upper lip and part of the jaw, and cutting away part of his tongue.

The wound is a frightful one, which was at first thought to be fatal, but the young man is now believed to be out of danger of his life. Drs. McHenry and Dulitz dressed the wounds, and although Dr. McHenry is an old army surgeon, he says he has seen but few more frightful wounds than this, instance. Spangler made good his escape, and up to this time his whereabouts are unknown.

THE GREAT CELESTIAL EVENT.—No one event has ever shown the growth of American science more distinctly than the interest people have taken in the present great comet. The fact that its discovery was made by private citizens and with the naked eye, and by many hundreds in all parts of the land at about the same time, proves that people do search and study the skies, and take an interest in the heavenly bodies. Few things contribute more toward the expansion of man into the great things of life than thoughts upon the immensity of the universe, and the advance of civilization is marked more clearly in this respect than in almost any other.

The present comet from careful views secured at the Warner Observatory, Rochester, N. Y., proves to be a most marvelous one. Its tail proper, which strange to say curved originally in an opposite direction to that most common with comets, became suddenly absorbed by a most vigorous out-shoot, or secondary tail, which stretched upward nearly sixty degrees, and could be seen even to Pi Draconis, more than twenty degrees above the North Star.

The activity around the nucleus of the head showing great masses of matter—its extreme length—its sudden appearance and its phenomenal actions, have justly made it a cause of great wonder and comment. It is a vexed question as to whom the honor of discovery and the Warner prize of 200 a due. There are hundreds of claimants from all parts of the Northern Hemisphere, and ranging in time over a period of 5 days, but it is almost certain that the first view of it was obtained by some private citizen, and not by an astronomer; and it is also pretty sure, that an American deserves the credit of having seen it before any European. The name of the first discoverer will be duly published.

The value which this great comet will have, cannot readily be estimated, as it is the first large one which has appeared since the discovery of the spectroscope, and it is almost certain that the elements are determined, so that the exact formation of comets may be known hereafter.

Directly opposite the Court House. 2t VENDOR'S FORECAST FOR JULY.—The month of July will enter cool and wet and give a great deal of rain generally over a large portion of the United States and Canada. The storms of wind, thunder and lightning are likely to prove severe and frequent. The heaviest rains in New York and vicinity I would locate shortly after the 20th, probably the 21st or 22d. Between the 12th and 20th days an excessively hot term is probable throughout both Canada and the United States, with additional severe storms in western sections. Within a few days of the close of July, likely in the neighborhood of the 27th and 28th days, a cool to cold wave may occur, carrying frosts in Canada and cold weather generally with storms of wind, hail and rain over the United States. Where storms have been severely felt in Western and Southern States during June there again will severest storms in July be experienced; notwithstanding, however, these frequent and severe storms during July, frequent alternations of fine, hot weather will probably counteract to a great extent the damage done grain and other crops in general in the West. The entry of July as above sketched, is likely to be cool and showery in both Canada and the United States, and stormy weather, with a return to sultriness, is probable, in proximity to the 4th in most sections.
