NEWSPAPER DECISIONS

1. Any person who takes a paper regularly from the post-office—whether directed to his name or another's or whether he has subscribed or not—is responsible for the payment.

2. If a person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount, whether the paper is taken from the office or not.

3. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them unopened for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.

Disastrous Result of Advertising.

An old man named Jesse Baldwin—a miserly crank, whose residence is five miles south of Youngstown, in Mahoning county, this State—went to Washington a few weeks ago and cashed, in gold, \$17,000 of bonds. His conduct in the city after receiving his money was such that to save him from being robbed, he was taken in charge by the city authorities and sent safely home. The affair got into the papers, and the old man's place of residence, the amount of money he was supposed to have and where he kept it, were extensively advertised, together with much other valuable information in the premises to the burglarious fraternity of the country. Just as might have been expected, the old gentleman was robbed on the night of the 14th inst. of \$40,000 in gold, and two horses and a carriage. After proceeding some miles, the burglars broke their carriage down. They then stole five horses from farmers in the vicinity and continued their flight. It is supposed that the number of burglars corresponded with the number of horses stolen. Baldwin has offered \$1,000 reward for the capture of the soundrels. No arrests have been made.

Potatoes are shipped to this country from Ireland, and are sold at lower rates than the American product. One day last week eight hundred bags of them reached this port on the White Star steamer Celtic. Thirty tons were shipped on the Wisconsin and about fifty tons were on their way on the Britannic, and more expected on the Adriatic. The greater quantity of these potatoes come from the North of Ireland. Hitherto the potato has more frequently traveled from American ports to Ireland, and one dealer said "Even the potatoes in Ireland cannot live under British rule, and must fly to a land of liberty."—N. Y. Observer.

Ole Bull, the Norwegian violinist, undertook to start a colony in Pennsylvania a quarter of a century ago. He brought forty square miles of wild, mountainous, Norway like land in Potter county, brought over 500 Norwegians, built houses for them like those they had left behind, and set himself up for a kind of ruling patron. The enterprise was a failure, and the three villages which he founded are to-day almost deserted, while the original colonists are scattered. The music hall was recently torn down.
