There is only one way to restore silver to its old position as a money metal and that is by free coinage at the ratio sixteen to one. Purchasing silver and issuing paper on it will not do, as the so called Bland and Sherman acts have conclusively shown. What is wanted is to take silver out of the market as a commodity and place it among the money metals. This can alone be done by free coinage at the old ratio which will restore it to its old value of \$1.291 an ounce. For when the government gives the holder of silver bullion the option of will fix the price in the markets and none can be bought for less money for any other purpose. The gold bugs object to this by saying that the silver miners would reap the sole benefits. This is a flimsy subterfuge. As is well known, England uses our cheap silver to break down the values
