FOR THE FIRST TIME. The County Commissioners Settle a Dead Lock in a School Board.

In the matter of hiring teachers for the ensuing school year the Highgate board of education has been in a dead lock all summer. There were two teachers to be hired and there were four candidates. Half the board favored Miss Gunn and Miss Bard while the other half were unwavering in their support of Mrs. Weller and Miss Eger. Frequent meetings of the board have been held at which many ballots were taken but there was no break in the dead lock. A proposition to compromise was rejected and finally a resolution was passed instructing the clerk of the board to notify the County Commissioners that they (the Highgate board of education) were unable to agree, and under Sec. 3609, Revised Statutes, authorizing County Commissioners to hire teachers, etc., where the boards of education do not agree, the Commissioners on Monday employed Miss Welsted, of this city, and Miss Gunn, of Holgate. We believe this is the first time in the history of the county that the Commissioners have been called upon to settle a dead lock in a board of education.

"Didn't Receive a Dame's One" The Defiance News in speaking of the republican congressional convention, among other things, says: "The convention was an uneventful one. Pandemonium reigned in the Henry county delegation and a riot was almost imminent. Chairman Bowersox lubricated the troubled water by suggesting that Henry 'try it over.' The delegates got together and patched up the matter. The ballot as amended showed the three votes had swelled to 9."

Out the Thistles. A law passed last winter makes the cutting of thistles compulsory. The mayor of a village must give notice to cut and destroy the same. If he neglects this duty he is subject to a fine of \$50.00. Lot owners must cut and destroy the thistles. If they neglect or refuse to obey the law, the street commissioner must hire help at 15 cents an hour, cut the thistles and notify the owner to do the same. If he neglects this duty he is subject to a fine of \$1.00 for each lot, to the county commissioners, who must charge the amount against such lots on the tax duplicate. If the street commissioner refuses or neglects to perform this duty, he shall be fined. The law is iron-clad and must be enforced.

A Miraculous Escape. On Thursday last week the little three-year old child of Mr. John D. Harrison, of Harrison township, fell from a load of wheat, one of the wheels of the heavy wagon passing over its head and back, and the child was picked up it was thought that the life had been crushed out of it. Dr. Maerker was called, who, after making a thorough examination, pronounced that no bones were broken, that the scumming of the child was uninjured other than severe bruises. It was indeed a miraculous escape from death, the child's life probably being saved by its falling on loose soft ground, which in a measure protected the body as the wheel passed over it.

The Weather According to Prof. Foster. My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from August 4th to 8th and the next will reach the Pacific coast about the 9th, cross the western mountains by close of 10th, the great central valleys from 11th to 13th and the eastern states about the 14th.

While a general deficiency of rain is expected in August this storm wave and the one following will give a few showers of small extent. During drought periods the storm waves cross the country so far north that their effects are seen only in the high temperature waves.

The warm wave will cross the western mountains about the 9th, the great central valleys about the 11th and the eastern states about the 13th. The cool wave will cross the western mountains about the 12th, the great central valleys about the 14th and the eastern states about the 16th.

The drought will do most damage during first and last weeks in August and most rain will fall during the ten days, 11th to 30th inclusive.
