WOOL PRICES UNDER FREE WOOL.

The Wool Growers Get Good Prices for Their Clips Under the New Tariff.

WHEELING, W. VA., Sept. 9.—(Special).—The good effects of the new tariff bill on the wool market are coming more rapidly than even its most hearty supporters had dared to wish.

The correspondent at Woodfield, O., the center of a large wool-raising country, represented in Congress by A. J. Pearson, whose place was jeopardized by his vote for free wool, reports that Alexander Harmon sold 10,000 pounds of wool within a week at 26 cents, and was offered as much for the remainder of his clip.

Several instances where wool has sold in the West Virginia pan-handle at from 20 to 23 cents are reported. Most of the wool buyers are Republicans and the fairy stories they have told wool raisers within the past three months are remarkable.

SECRETARY CARLISLE, in a letter to Congressman Heard, says the mints at Philadelphia, New Orleans and San Francisco have been and are now engaged in coining standard silver dollars, and that during the past eleven months \$3,970,727 was coined from the bullion purchased under the Sherman act, and have been paid out in the redemption of treasury notes, and that during the last two months \$1,258,000 of silver dollars have been coined and will continue to be coined in about the same amount.

Forty-one counties of Ohio pay more money into the state school fund than they draw for the state for school purposes; while forty-seven counties draw out more money than they pay in.

The Democratic tariff bill is saying more in a minute in its own behalf than its enemies can say against it in a month. It talks direct through the people's pocket books and that is what tells every time.

SUGAR IS CHEAPER

Than Before the Passage of the New Tariff Bill.

Everyone is interested in the price of sugar.

The Blade a few days ago announced that the price of sugar had advanced in price three cents a pound.

Not only is this not true but it is a fact that sugar is cheaper today than before the passage of the recent tariff bill.

Let there should be caviling over this point the list of prices furnished the Bee by Berdan & Co. is herewith given.

The figures are the closing prices on refined sugar on September 22, 1893, and September 22, 1894. It may be stated here that there has been a continual decline in the price of sugar during the past month.

CLOSING PRICE REFINED SUGARS. Sept. 22 '93 Sept. 22 '94. Cut Leaf... \$5.81 \$5.20

The above is the price per hundred pounds. The reduction therefore is—

Cut Leaf per cent... 55 cents. Crushed... 50 cents. Powdered... 45 cents. Granulated... 40 cents.

The ratio of decline in all other grades of sugar is about the same. So that sugar is not only not as dear as a year ago but it is much cheaper.

"Is sugar as dear as it was a year ago?" a Bee asked an expert at Berdan & Co.'s Saturday.

"No. Nor as dear today as it was yesterday. I am a Republican, but I must say our Republican papers are making a mistake in this matter.

Here are the closing prices of refined sugar for today and one year ago."

The gentleman produced a table of figures containing the facts given above.

"As you are possibly aware," the Bee continued, "the Republican papers claim that sugar has advanced three cents since the passage of the recent tariff bill. Is it true?"

"No. Just the contrary. Sugar has declined and is going down every day. The closing price to day was 12 cents a hundred below yesterday."

"What causes the decline?"

"There are two chief factors. First, the sugar crop this year was unusually large, and again the handlers of sugar laid in an extra heavy supply. Every one stocked up full prior to the passage of the new tariff bill, and the result is that stocks are so large that it is necessary to cut close to sell at all. It is the old, old law of supply and demand."

"What figure does the duty on sugar cut, if any?"

"Under ordinary circumstances the duty on sugar would have caused an advance of about a cent a pound. If the causes which I have named had not existed; that is, if the sugar crop was fair and the amount of surplus on hand not so large, I would have expected that sugar would have advanced about a cent a pound."

"Is there any prospect of an advance?"

"Perhaps; but there is another large crop in sight and the supply is going to continue greater than the demand for at least another year."

"Whom does the duty on sugar benefit?"

"Oh, the government largely. It is peculiarly a tariff for revenue. You take raw sugar, which costs 2 1/2 cents a pound, the importer pays—and eventually the consumer—the duty of one cent a pound to the government. As the price of raw sugar advances the duty becomes proportionately heavier. The revenue goes, however, to the government."

"Then it is a fact that the price of sugar has not and possibly will not advance?"

"It is a solemn fact that sugar is cheaper than it was yesterday or a year ago today."

UPPER SANDUSKY, O., Sept. 24.—Upper Sandusky is jubilant. For almost a year the town has been without natural gas owing to shortage of supply. The Home Gas and Oil company, however, has struck a well that it drilled further in the Trenton and undoubtedly the largest gusher in Ohio. Drilling was stopped at the first vein, only nine feet in the sand, and that vein has a capacity of 4,000,000 cubic feet and a rock pressure of over 500 pounds to the square inch. The driller agreed that by keeping back the main volume salt water will not interfere and the well will be good for a dozen years.
