MURDERED AT DESHLER. TWO MEN KILLED AND ONE FATALLY INJURED. Unknown Tramps Charged With The Deed.

POSTORIA, O., Dec. 8.—Eastbound freight No. 26, on the Baltimore and Ohio, which arrived here about 1 o'clock this morning, brought in two bodies of men who had been foully murdered at Deshler; also another man badly wounded and who will probably die from the result of his wounds.

The ghostly find was made by Brakeman Beeber at Bloomdale, a short distance west of this city, he hearing the wounded man groan.

The suffering man was made as comfortable as possible and the train pulled to this city, where the bodies of the two dead were conveyed to Asire's undertaking rooms, and the wounded man conveyed to the American, where medical aid was summoned and promptly rendered by Surgeon Henry of the B. & O., assisted by other physicians.

The wounded man says his name is Henry Harris, and that he is married and has a wife and two children.

His companions were Henry Reesh and Arthur E. Brown, also of Auburn, and that the trio had boarded the freight for the purpose of starting out in search of work.

They entered the box car and rode as far as Defiance, and as the train was pulling out of the siding the car was invaded by four men, who, when the train arrived at Deshler, demanded their money and commenced shooting at them before receiving a reply.

Reesh and Brown are young men and are unmarried, and were engaged in the money secured could not have been very large in amount, as the men were trying to steal a ride to some point where there were prospects of securing work.

The murderers are supposed to have been a number of tough characters who were driven out of Garret by the marshal yesterday.

Harris states that he thinks the murderers left the train at Deshler immediately after the shooting was done. He was dazed and does not have a clear concept of what transpired after being struck in the head by the bullets.

Upon investigation here, proves to be only a flesh injury and the ball struck and glanced around on the outside of the ribs. Harris had only \$12 taken and the watch broken, had stopped \$15. The train left Garret at 4:20.

There is no clue to the perpetrators of the horrible butchery as yet.

None of the murdered or injured men were armed.

POSTORIA, O., Dec. 9.—Henry Harris, the surviving victim of Friday night's terrible butchery at Deshler, is still alive and is much better to-day, but the doctors say that he cannot recover. They probed for several of the balls to-day and could not find any of them, but found that his skull had been pierced three times, and that one of the bullets had lodged in his brain.

There is no important clue to the murderers. A report was circulated here last night that four men had entered a private residence at Deshler Friday night about 10 o'clock and demanded a meal of the woman of the house which she supplied them; that afterwards they amused themselves about a half an hour on a piano and when they got tired of that, they kicked the key off the instrument for amusement. After they had left the lady gave the alarm and the fellows were seen to board a south bound C. H. & D. freight train.
