The Weather According to Foster. My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from 16th to 20th and the next, which was due in Japan, about December 28th will reach the Pacific coast near the Columbia river's mouth about the 20th, cross the western mountains by close of 21st, the Missouri valley and upper lake 23rd, Ohio valley, east gulf and lower lakes 24th, eastern states 25th and Newfoundland 30th.

The path of the storm center will lie along the northern border of the United States, causing unusually warm weather all over the country preceding and during the passage of the disturbance, only moderately cool weather following. Rainfall from the disturbance will be limited to small areas and excessive evaporation will cause drought in many parts of the country. Better rains may be expected from the next disturbance.

Warm wave will cross the western mountain country about 20th, the great central valleys about 22nd, and the eastern states about 24th. Cool wave will cross the western mountain country about 23rd, the great central valleys about 25th and the eastern states about 27th. My forecast of 1st day November has been wonderfully well verified, not more than half the usual amount of rain having fallen during the past month.
