Dinner to the Home Guard.

The young men of Southington, to the number of about sixty having organized themselves into a Reserve Military Company, the ladies of that township, by way of showing their interest in, and appreciation of the movement, gave them a dinner on Saturday last. The spot selected, was in a beautiful grove, near the Presbyterian Church, just north of the centre. When Mr. Ritzel of the Democrat and ourself (who had the honor of an invitation to be present,) reached there, the Guard were on parade, uniformed in scarlet shirts or blouses, and black caps, making a fine appearance and going through their evolutions in a very creditable manner. Their Captain is Dr. Moore, who makes an excellent officer. The band of martial music was the best we have heard this season, (except at Camp Taylor) and reminded us strongly of the general martial days of our boyhood. There were two fifeers, two snare drummers, and one bass drummer, and they were all really good performers.

A long table was stretched under the shade, loaded with eatables, enough to have fed a regiment, and around it were baskets without number, in reserve. Around and among these the Southington ladies were fitting in the way ladies have on such occasions.

When all ready, the Guards were marched to the table, and when they were seated, with a few invited guests, they were addressed by Homer Norton, Esq., in a short but pithy speech, which was responded to by Capt. Moore. Grace was said by Rev. Mr. Dye, and the attack upon the table commenced. The charge was vigorous but the rebuttal was too well fortified and supplied with ammunition, and the soldiers gave up the job. A pyramidal cake surrounded by a miniature flag was presented to Capt. Moore by the ladies, to which he responded handsomely. The dinner was excellent, the arrangements good, the location beautiful, the speeches appropriate and brief, but there were no ladies at our table, to which arrangement we entered our cordial dissent.

After the soldiers had withdrawn, the table was re-supplied, and the ladies took their places. Seated at the head of the table, was Mrs. Hannah Viets, who with her husband, and Mr. Jas. Chalker and wife, came to Southington in the year 1805, and were the first settlers in that township. Many were the changes her eyes have seen since first they looked upon the then unbroken wilderness trodden by wild beasts and the wilder red men, where now churches rear their spires, and there are peaceful dwellings and cultivated fields.

After the ladies had ended their repast, again the table was filled, and when we left, the supply of eatables was still abundant, though the lemonade which once filled the new cheese vat had begun perceptibly to grow shallow.

A Grocery Emptied. We learn that on Friday, as the Youngstown (three years) volunteers, who had been home on a short visit, was returning on the C. & M. R. R. a number of them got off the cars at Garrettsville and in about two minutes completely cleaned out the grocery at the depot, pitching every thing into the street. The cause of the act, as we are told, was that when the volunteers were returning to Youngstown about a week since, one of them went into this grocery, and purchased a pie, giving the grocery keeper a dollar bill to change. He went, or sent out to get the bill changed, and while the volunteer was waiting, the train started and he was left to foot it to Youngstown (30 miles) which he did, the same night. In revenge for this, (as it is said) the company emptied the grocery.
