Speeches.

On the first page of this number of the CHRONICLE will be found a report of the very able and eloquent speech of the Republican candidate for Lieut. Gov. of Ohio, Hon. Jacob Mueller, delivered at a meeting at Akron. We also published extracts from a recent speech of Gen. Garfield, at Cincinnati, in which he discusses the propriety and necessity of calling a constitutional convention. The weight of his argument is to show that railroad corporations are rapidly and dangerously absorbing the functions of the government of the people; or, in other words, are making mere tools of Legislatures and State functionaries, and are exercising a most dangerous influence as public corporations. Mr. Garfield would have some stringent constitutional limitations to railroad usurpation, and thinks the postponement of the day for providing such needed protection for twenty years longer would be unwise as to the scheme on the part of the railroad corporations to have a local tax levied should be further restricted by the constitution. Because the Auditor of State's report shows that the people spend six dollars in local improvements to one dollar spent in support of the State government, there is impending ruin for us. We submit that if the tables were reversed and we were paying six dollars to uphold an extravagant central or State government, to one dollar expended for the purpose of local improvement, there would be some ground for complaint, and some ground for crying out for reform and retrenchment. But we have always held that the people in their local capacity should not be bound and controlled by a central or State government, but should be free to determine their own affairs, and to tax themselves for the erection of school houses, paving and lighting streets, building and improving roads, &c. There is a great difference in our judgment, whether the people are taxed for the benefit of a set of corrupt officials, an extravagant State or general government, or whether the money so raised is to be expended among themselves, in their own behalf, to enhance their comfort and the value of their local interests and individual property. We hold that it is entirely safe to leave this question of levying local taxes to the tax-payers to decide as to the necessity and propriety thereof. The fact is, that local taxation for the purpose of public improvement scarcely ever inflicts any serious or permanent injury on any one taxed. The enhancement of values consequent upon the improvements, generally, in a year or two, far exceeds, brings them all out more than even. Liberal taxation of the safety is elevated, if the fruits realized are needed and substantial improvements.

The British steamer Cleto has been chartered, at Shanghai, at five pounds five shillings, to bring twelve hundred tons of tea to San Francisco, to be conveyed by rail to New York.

It thought executive measures will soon be taken ordering Kansas squatters, who have settled on a portion of the Indian Territory, to vacate it under certain pains and penalties, the land being not set apart for the sole use of Indians.

The proposed new constitution of Nebraska takes two or three steps in advance. It establishes compulsory education, a franchise, gives power to towns to prohibit the liquor traffic, and permits females to vote.

Some of the Georgia papers encourage the proposition to send the Georgia militia to the South to be paid for by the slaves, and the spoil divided with the negroes, if they promptly lend their support to the "claim."

Over 2,500 members of the Howe family gathered, at Harmony Grove, Farmington Mass., yesterday. Representatives were present from every State in the Union, and from several foreign countries.

The Postoffice Department established two thousand four hundred and seven new offices, and discontinued eight hundred and sixty-four during the year. On the 30th of June, last year, there were thirty thousand and forty-five offices in the United States.

The Youngstown Courier put its readers into a broad grin, last week, by asserting that A. J. Packard, a Democrat of the most ferocious variety, intended to vote for the "Prohibition candidate for Representative in Mahoning county. Such verbiage is a rarity.

The indictments are found against the President and Superintendent of the State Island Ferry Company and the engineer of the Westfield, are for manslaughter in the third degree. The indictment against James K. Matthews, United States Inspector of Boilers, is for manslaughter in the fourth degree.

Cleveland has surpassed almost every other city in the growth during the past decade, and manufactures did it. The Herald says that the city now has fourteen rolling mills, with two hundred budding furnaces, and a daily capacity of four hundred tons of cast iron. There are five stove foundries, one machine iron works, one and a half boiler works, six boiler-plate and sheet-iron works of large capacity, three foundries for making up wheels and castings for buildings, one large manufacturing of cross-cut circular and other saws.

Janestown, N.Y. is excited over the discovery of the remains of a gigantic elephant, near that city. One tusks measure three feet seven and one-half inches in length, and six and one-half inches in diameter. Of late many specimens of this gigantic animal have been discovered, and not a few in Ohio.

The California state election is held to day. A Governor, and several other state officials will be chosen, also a Congressional delegation.

The Saratoga races ended on Wednesday, and the struggle between Longfellow and Holmdahl was the feature. The latter, to the surprise of almost everybody, was the winner. The other races were won by Mossell and Bolus.

Four officers are candidates for the next Ohio Senate, all with first class prospects for being elected.—Wm. Nash, of the Gallipolis Journal, Sam'l Knox, formerly editor of the Cadiz Republican, and R. M. Silmon, of the Marietta Register, all Republicans, and L. B. Leeds, Democrat, of the Brown County News.

The Union S. S. Convention at Pleasant Hill, Ohio.

EDITOR CHRONICLE:—By order of Committee, we submit for publication in your paper the following report:
The Union S. S. Convention convened at Pleasant Hill, Ohio, on Friday, August 26th, at 1 o'clock, P. M., to hold its first session. Rev. H. B. Summers was declared chairman, by reason of his having called for the convention. Secretaries chosen were: Prayer, Rev. E. A. Hoffman; Minutes, Rev. E. A. Hoffman; Resolutions, Rev. E. A. Hoffman; and Finance, Rev. E. A. Hoffman.

All arrangements with the Erie Railway Company were completed at noon on Friday, and the two lines were merely connecting roads. This, however, will work no inconvenience to the traveling or business public, who will have the same facilities as before. To say the least, important changes are being made in the route of the line, which will make the Atlantic and Great Western independent of the Erie and Pennsylvania, and will be a great benefit to the traveling public. A few of these changes we indicate; others in connection with it is not yet prepared to announce.

The first step, to be taken immediately, is the laying of a double track (main track) with steel rails, on the Cleveland Branch (Cleveland and Mahoning). This is rendered necessary by the immense business, local and through, pouring over the line between Leavittsburg and Cleveland.
