Fire Chief Thrown from Buggy. Springfield, July 7.—In an accident, in which spectators expected to see Fire Chief Samuel E. Hunter killed, that official was only slightly injured when his buggy, driven at top speed, collided with an auto fire engine, running to a fire. The chief turned a corner and ran directly into the engine. He was thrown to the ground and the buggy demolished, while the horse he was driving was badly cut up. A GRIET OF NEWS FROM VARIOUS CITIES IN OHIO.

Short Chronicles of a Day's Happenings as Told by Telegraph for Our Readers. STATE CAPITAL CULLINGS. Out of a class of 183 applicants examined by the Ohio state medical board June 8, 9 and 10, all passed but 14. The board has completed the examination of the papers and announces the names of those who passed and will receive certificates as physicians.

Charles Wolfe, 18, of Grogan, a suburb, is dead of a bullet wound sustained as a result of an accident during a Fourth of July celebration. Josh Temple, a companion who held the revolver, is heart-broken over the affair. He was detained over night by the police, but released when the dead boy's father refused to prosecute. The wheat crop this year will fall far short of that of last year, according to the monthly report of the state board of agriculture. The acreage to be harvested is one of the smallest in years, and it is estimated that at least nine per cent of the original area seeded last fall has been ploughed up in a spring, leaving but 1,296,998 acres remaining for the harvest. This is a shortage of 590,000 acres compared with the area harvested in 1908.

World's Oldest University. The University of Oxford has the honor of being the oldest of the world's great seats of learning. It is supposed to have been founded by King Alfred in 872, although the early records of the institution are not extant and the exact date of its foundation is not known. It was not until nearly 400 years later—1257—that Oxford's rival, Cambridge university, was founded. Meantime the University of Paris had been established by King Philip II, a distinguished patron of learning for his time, in about 1200. Harvard university is the oldest institution of learning in the United States, having been founded in 1636 as the New College, William and Mary college came near being the first in this country. The latter steps for its foundation were taken as early as 1617, but it was not until 1683 that a charter was granted and the college opened at Williamsburg, Va.

Firm Butter Without Ice. In families where the dairy is small, a good plan to have the butter cool and firm without ice is by the process of evaporation, as practiced in India and other warm countries. A cheap plan is to get a very large sized, porous earthen flower pot with a large saucer. Half fill the saucer with water, set it in a trivet, or light stand such as is used for holding hot irons will do. Upon this set your butter; over the whole invert the flower pot, letting the top rim of it rest in and covered by the water; then close the hole in the bottom of the flower pot with a cork; then dash water over the flower pot, and repeat the process several times a day, or whenever it looks dry. If set in a cool place, or where the wind can blow on it, it will readily evaporate the water from the pot, and the butter will be as firm and cool as if in an ice-house.

GIVE UP NICKELS BY TONS.

Interesting Facts Brought Out Regarding System of Rapid Transit in New York. If each of the 1,056,000,000 passengers who rode on the surface cars of Greater New York last year had paid a nickel there would be enough coins to carpet Madison Square park to the depths of an inch and a half. A column 1,035 miles in height could be built out of the nickels if placed one on top of another. End to end they would reach a distance of 13,000 miles, a distance as great as that from New York city to Shanghai, China. These are among the many curious facts regarding New York transit conditions brought out by the graphic chart prepared by D. L. Turner, chief inspector of the public service commission. Assuming that each passenger paid five cents, the total would be \$51,800,000, about 5,550 tons of nickels.
