SHOOTING TRAMPS AWAY.

An exchange from a nearby Ohio town tells the story of two tramps who were arrested a day or two ago, kept over night in the lockup and the next morning ordered by the mayor to get out of town as fast as their legs would carry them. The report does not state whether they were given anything to eat before starting, but the man who thinks the proper way to deal with tramps is to scare them over into the next township would, perhaps, feel that they ought to go before breakfast. This method of dealing with tramps or with men who happen simply to be out of employment is very common, but it is as weak and cowardly as it is common. Driving an undesirable visitor out of the city where the rights of property and person are guarded by a police force into the country where the families live far apart and have no police protection is something that no wise and thoughtful mayor will ever do.

If there is no work for the tramp to perform, he is not to be blamed for his enforced idleness. If there is work for him, it should be placed before him and he be compelled to do it. If every community would take care of the tramps within its own borders, the tramp problem would be solved and solved properly and permanently; but to drive them from one community to another leaves the question as far from solution as ever. This method of dealing with the subject is on a par with that of the man who has a worthless cat which he wishes to get rid of. Lacking the courage to dispose of the animal in a proper manner, he carries it off and leaves it on a neighbor's porch, hoping that the neighbor may do what he himself lacks the courage to perform.—Pittsburg Post.
