

SHORT NEWS NOTES.

Washington

The right of the federal government to bring actions to have set aside some 3,000 conveyances by full-blooded Cherokee Indians of their allotted lands was upheld by the Supreme court of the United States in Washington.

The United States senate rejected the Sherwood dollar a day pension bill, which carried additional pension expenditure of \$75,000,000, and adopted Senator McCumber's substitute measure, which is based on both age and service and which will increase the pension expenditures by approximately \$37,000,000 annually.

The right of Senator Lorimer of Illinois to his seat in the United States senate was upheld by the special investigating committee, which decided that the senate's vote sustaining Mr. Lorimer in the same charges barred any further proceedings against him. The vote was 5 to 3. Another resolution adopted exonerated Edward Hines, the Chicago lumberman, of any wrongdoing.

Domestic

Under the will of the late Susan Monroe of Fall River, Mass., her estate, valued at \$100,000, will be placed in trust and the income used to provide for the care and support of her horse, Daisy. The animal is thirty-one years old and probably will not live long. After the mare's death the money is to be divided by the testatrix's nephews and nieces.

When the guns are stilled aboard the flagship of the Duke d'Abruzzi, rear admiral of the Italian fleet, he will listen to whisperings from Miss Katherine Elkins, waited through a phonograph, which she has sent to him, according to a report from Washington.

With only two exceptions the suspension in the coal mining industry of the country, which went into effect when the wage contracts between members of the United Mine Workers of America and the bituminous and anthracite coal operators expired, was general. Approximately 450,000 are idle.

The floods in Missouri, Illinois and Kentucky are the worst on record. Property loss already has run into the millions.

The mystery surrounding the murder of Dr. Helene Knabe, the woman physician who was found dead with her throat cut last October in Indianapolis, has been solved. Beth Nichols, a deserter from the United States ship Dixie, confessed to Chief of Police Entwistle of Portsmouth that he murdered Dr. Knabe and that he had been paid \$1,500 by an Indianapolis man to put the doctor out of the way.

Juarez Cross of the United States district court, in a suit of the Westinghouse Air Brake company against the New York Air Brake company for infringement of patent, at Trenton, N. J., decided in favor of the Westinghouse company, sustaining the patent covering the quick-scrive brake apparatus known as the type "K" triple valve.

The First National and Capitol National banks of Denver will consolidate under the name of the First National with combined resources of \$25,000,000.

Freel Allen, youngest of the Allen outlaws, was captured at the home of his father, Jack Allen, near Hillsville, Va. Freel, who is a lad of eighteen years, with pink cheeks and light of build, had separated from the other members of the band who shot and killed five men in the local courthouses and sought refuge at the home of his parents.

Equal suffrage for women is largely responsible for the marked decrease in the number of marriage licenses issued in California during the month of March, according to County Clerk Ed Pfund of Sacramento, Cal.

The defeated parties of the "patent monopoly case," recently decided 4 to 3, by the Supreme court of the United States at Washington, have asked the court to rehear the issue before a full bench.

Oxford won with the greatest ease the sixty-ninth annual boat race between eight-oared crews representing the universities of Oxford and Cambridge over the usual course on the Thames from Putney, England, to Mortlake.

Twenty high schools in central and northern Wisconsin sent representatives to Eau Claire, Wis., to organize the Northwestern Interscholastic association. The schools have broken away from the Wisconsin association.

Charles E. Hutton, hearing proxies of fifty delegates to the Republican territorial convention which meets at Nome, Alaska, has arrived from Nome, completing a two thousand-mile dog team journey begun February 17.

The proposition to bond San Francisco for \$3,800,000 for land and municipal buildings in the proposed civic center was carried by an overwhelming majority.

The jury in the case of John H. Parsons, Washington, E. Thomas, George H. Frasier and Arthur Donner, charged with violating the criminal clause of the Sherman anti-trust law, while directors of the American Sugar Refining company, reported a disagreement in the United States district court.

Governor Deneen affixed his signature to the presidential preference primary bill which had been passed by both branches of the Illinois legislature. This action by the governor

made the proceedings necessary to make the law effective immediately. The presidential primaries will be held throughout the state on April 9.

The postal savings bank which has been open at Minier, Ill., since March 1, has not one deposit.

Seventeen thousand carpenters, employed on 500 buildings in Chicago, went on strike this morning, holding up contract work to an aggregate of more than \$35,000,000. This strike was brought about by the refusal of the Chicago Carpenters' council to grant an increase in pay.

Acting Secretary of State Wilson confirmed a report from Mexico City that all dependable Americans there were to be armed for their own defense and that other foreign governments were taking similar action. It was announced that Ambassador Wilson would distribute among the Americans 1,000 army rifles and revolvers, on the way to that city.

The Newcastle county (Del.) superior court granted a divorce to John Bancroft, Jr., from his wife, Madeleine De Pont Bancroft, one of the Du Pont heiresses. The families of the couple are among the most prominent in Delaware and the charges made in connection with the case were of a sensational nature.

Gov. Walter R. Stubbs of Kansas has requested the secretary of state of Nebraska to withdraw his name from the list of candidates for the Republican preferential nomination for vice-president. This leaves only John O. Yleser of Omaha and Albert Beveridge of Indiana as candidates.

Miss Violet Wade, a talented soprano of Chicago, and John Charles Thompson of Lynn, Mass., son of wealthy parents, ran afoul of the "health marriage" propaganda begun by Dean Sumner of Chicago. The couple was refused a license to wed because of the impaired condition of the health of the prospective bridegroom.

Foreign

During the recent crisis in the Hungarian cabinet at Vienna, Austria, Emperor Francis Joseph at one time threatened to abdicate unless certain proposals in connection with the controversy over the army were granted.

The United States cruiser Washington, which arrived at San Juan, Porto Rico, with Secretary of State Knox and his party on board, has sailed for Port au Prince, Haiti.

President Francisco Madero of Mexico has decided upon a vigorous campaign against the rebels, and the American government has consented to permit the shipment from the United States of arms and ammunition for his soldiers.

Personal

Maj. Gen. Frederick Dent Grant, U. S. A., commander of the department of the east, has left his post at Governor's Island and gone south on a four months' sick leave to recover his health.

Lloyd C. Griscom, former American ambassador to Italy, is in a critical condition in the Bryn Mawr hospital, Philadelphia, where he underwent an operation for acute stomach trouble.

Congressman W. J. Fields of the Ninth Kentucky district, who recently underwent a surgical operation, is able to leave the hospital at Louisville, Ky.

Dates for American mining congress in Spokane, Wash., were fixed for November 25-30.

Ten million dollars' worth of Pittsburgh (Pa.) realty was transferred by Henry Phipps, Sr., to his three sons, John S. Henry and Howard Phipps, all 57.

Dr. L. W. Lytleg, president of the Iowa State Medical society, delivered the opening address at the semi-annual session of the Missouri Valley Medical society at Colfax, Ia.

Dr. Harvey W. Wiley closed a contract in New York to give 100 lectures throughout the United States next season.

LETTER FROM KANSAS.

Winfield, Kan., April 2, 1912. Editor Dispatch:—I am mindful my subscription has nearly expired. Enclosed please find renewal. We miss our weekly news if for any cause it is delayed a day. I find very few names of old friends now. The new names give me employment to place them. I am one of the "shut-ins" and much of my time is occupied in reading and writing to my friends when I am not resting. I have many friends and relatives in several counties in Ohio, but "old" Mahoning is very dear to me. We like Kansas, but my childhood home has precious memories. We in this part of the state have experienced a very cold winter. The coldest days near us was 12 degrees below zero. In our 28 years in Cowley county this was an unusually cold winter. March 23 we had 13 inches of snow, drifting east and west roads, making them impassable for from one to three days. Travelers were obliged to take down fences and drive through plowed ground and meadows to get to north and south roads, which were all right. In the north and west parts of the state there was much suffering for want of feed for stock; also provisions and fuel. Very little oats has been sown, the ground being too wet to plow or disk. Some have commenced planting which looks cheerful. We have a prospect for fruit. This year our spring is six weeks late. Flowers, perennial, are coming up fine and grass is growing on low lands. Wheat looks well. Yesterday, April 1, we had our first April shower. My most sincere regards to all Mahoning friends. I trust we may all receive the Dispatch for many years to come.
