SOLVED HITCHING POST PROBLEM

Athens, Ohio, July 23, 1915. Editor Dispatch:—Your notice about Salem's troubles over the hitching-rail problem reminds me that not many years ago the people of this city, a village then, had like difficulty to solve. In front of the college campus and not far from the center of the town was an open space on which the people from the surrounding country had been wont to hitch their horses from time immemorial. Owing to its central location it looked bad and smelt worse. The college authorities thought suit to get possession of the property, not because they wanted it, but because they wished to abolish the nuisance. After being dragged from one court to another for years a decision was finally rendered to the effect that as the space had originally been donated for a park it could not be enclosed, but neither could it be used for any other purpose. Some of the country people got mad and declared they would not trade in Athens any more, although hitching places had been provided elsewhere. It was not long, however, before it was discovered that they would trade where they could do best, and the town probably did not lose a customer. Yes, one man who had gone to a neighboring town, got drunk, and on his return, missed a bridge with his team and broke his neck. He never traded in Athens after that. Part of the vacant space is now occupied by a soldiers' monument which is a rest is a well kept lawn. If a vote were taken to go back to the former status a few men doubtless would vote "aye" out of pure "cussedness," but I do not think the proportion would be one in ten. You know a good many people were opposed to canals for the reason that they would put stage coaches out of business. After canals had been in use for some time the same kind of people opposed railroads because they would take trade from the canals. Later they were against automobiles because they scared horses. Some people are against good roads because they cost money. No matter how many people pull forward there are always a few who pull back.

All bids must be in the hands of the clerk not later than August 2, 1915. The board reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

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ORDINANCE

To Issue Bonds for the Purpose of Reconstructing and Repairing the West Side of North Broad Street, Beginning at the Village Limits north, and Extending South to the Intersection of East and West Main Streets in the Village of Canfield, and is hereby declared to be an emergency measure. Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Canfield, State of Ohio, two-thirds of the members elected thereto concurring: Section 1. That it is deemed necessary by the Council of the Village of Canfield, to issue and sell the bonds of said village in the sum of \$100,000 for the purpose of reconstructing and repairing the west side of North Broad street in said village. Sec. 2. That the bonds of said village be issued in the sum of \$1,000.00 for the aforesaid purpose; each of said bonds to be in the denomination of \$50.00, and numbered consecutively from 1 to 2, and all made payable on the 1st day of September 1916, and shall run for a period of five years from that date; and said bonds shall be placed in the hands of the village treasurer in the office of the Village of Canfield, State of Ohio. Sec. 3. Said bonds shall express upon their face the purpose for which they are issued and that they are issued in pursuance of this ordinance. They shall be prepared, issued and delivered under the direction of the street committee of the village and shall be signed by the mayor of said village and by the village clerk and sealed with the official seal of said village. Said bonds shall be registered in the office of the village clerk in the name of the purchaser and shall bear interest as aforesaid. Sec. 4. The proceeds from the sale of said bonds shall be placed in the village treasury to the credit of the Service Fund and shall be disbursed upon proper vouchers for the purpose of reconstructing and repairing the west side of North Broad street from the north village line south to the intersection of East and West Main streets and for no other purpose. Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law. Passed July 15, 1915. JAMES B. JONES, Mayor. S. A. Arnold, Clerk.

RESOLUTION

To Provide for the Reconstruction and Repair of the West Side of North Broad Street From the North to the Intersection of East and West Main Streets in the Village of Canfield, Ohio. Inasmuch as the present work on reconstruction and repair on the north and south side of the village line south to the intersection of East and West Main streets and for no other purpose. Sec. 2. That the Street Committee of the Village of Canfield be empowered to act in all matters pertaining to said reconstruction and repair, and to execute all contracts and specifications, conference with trustees of Canfield township, receive and receipt for the same, and the sale of bonds in the sum of \$100,000, arranged for with the Mayor and Clerk of said village, and to execute all contracts and specifications, therefore be it Resolved, By the Council of the Village of Canfield, Ohio: Section 1. That the west side of North Broad street, beginning at the borough line north and extending south to the intersection of East and West Main streets be reconstructed and repaired, the length of said street being about 1000 feet. Sec. 2. That said improved street be 24 feet wide and the last course or tread to be bound by bitumen (tarvis). Sec. 3. That the Street Committee of the Village of Canfield be empowered to act in all matters pertaining to said reconstruction and repair, and to execute all contracts and specifications, conference with trustees of Canfield township, receive and receipt for the same, and the sale of bonds in the sum of \$100,000, arranged for with the Mayor and Clerk of said village, and to execute all contracts and specifications, therefore be it Resolved, By the Council of the Village of Canfield, Ohio: Section 1. 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
