EAST YOUNGSTOWN MOB RULED

Striking Foreigners Riot, Burn, Pillage —Lives Are Lost—Militia Called to Restore Order.

A drink crazed mob composed of hundreds of foreigners, largely laborers at the Youngstown Sheet & Tube plant, out on strike for an increase in pay, ran riot in East Youngstown, five miles east of Youngstown, last Friday night and in a few hours practically wiped out the business section of the city. Sixty-nine structures were burned during the night or rioting, plunder and looted.

Between two and three hundred men have been arrested on rioting and other charges and thousands of dollars worth of loot recovered. Probably 40 men were wounded during the shooting and three deaths have resulted.

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION SCHOOL TALKS

Plase and Instruct Many Progressive Farmers in Canfield.

The county agricultural extension school opened Monday morning in college chapel for a session of five days with a fairly good attendance. The state instructor in charge, Elliott, soils, R. B. Cruickshank, horticulture, and L. P. Bailey, dairying.

The opening talk was on "Some Consideration of Soil Fertility." In the course of the discussion of this topic Mr. Elliott developed the thought that the soil, instead of being a very common, ordinary thing, even to be avoided at times, is a truly wonderful laboratory wherein chemical substances and living things work to the end of producing the crops in which we are interested.

With the development of the science of chemistry has come a partial understanding of the composition of the soil and its relation to the growing plant. The soil chemist tells us that the growing crops feed upon thirteen simple substances or elements. Some of these come from water, some from the air and some from the soil.

Home Economics Course A rare privilege indeed was that afforded the ladies of Canfield and vicinity who were permitted to attend the Home Economics Course of instruction given in the normal college in connection with the county extension school.

recognized by scientists that our problems of fertile soils and profitable crops are closely related to the conditions which favor or discourage the growth of beneficial soil bacteria.

It is especially rare with respect to the supply of nitrogen, the most expensive element of fertility when bought on the fertilizer market. An examination of the principle sources of nitrogen for crops and soil building shows that out of four, three are controlled directly by bacteria.

The second source of nitrogen to be noticed is humus, manure, good enough as far as it goes but on the vast majority of Ohio farms insufficient. The third source of nitrogen we will say is commercial fertilizer.

Legumes are the only crops which work together with bacteria in gathering nitrogen from the air and for this reason are indispensable in any system of economical soil building.
