HISTORY IS REPEATING

Democrats Said To Be Following Precedent in Choice.

History repeats itself in politics as in other human activities. Three times the democratic party has been in power and faced a crisis in public affairs of importance as the presidential election was near at hand.

When the term of James Buchanan was nearing its end the crisis of war was near. Buchanan had been unsatisfactory, and his administration was extremely unpopular and lacking in public favor.

When Grover Cleveland's term was nearing its end in 1896 he was in extreme disfavor. The country not only had faced but had been overwhelmed by a great financial crisis.

In 1920 as the term of Woodrow Wilson nears its end it is in disfavor and the country faces the tremendous test of readjustment and reconstruction following a great war.

CHAIRMAN WHITE'S ISSUE.

Whatever remains in left of the progressive sentiment which made political history eight years ago belongs by inheritance to the Cox and Roosevelt ticket now.

National Chairman White emphasizes this truth when he declares that "progressivism is to be the paramount issue of the campaign."

There is nothing in Senator Harding's record, his speech of acceptance or the platform on which he stands to merit the confidence or support of the progressiveness of any party.

What the senator said in bitter condemnation of the progressive party in 1912 stands, so far as the record shows, as his opinion today of those who broke away from the old parties in that year to follow the banner of Theodore Roosevelt.

Mr. Harding was nominated by the reactionary forces of the Chicago convention, as a reactionary to stand upon a reactionary platform.

Gov. Cox, on the other hand, was a progressive democrat from the moment the issue arose. He campaigned in Ohio for the constitution of 1912, at that time the most progressive state organic code ever proposed.

The same fall he was elected governor to head the state government as it undertook to write into statute the provisions of the new constitution, because he was recognized as the one best qualified for the task.

Chairman White cannot intend, of course, to sidetrack the League of Nations issue. To his mind "progressivism necessarily carries with it the League of Nations."

In a large sense, it does, though White's way of stating the fact may surprise many. The idea of civilized nations binding themselves together in friendly association to avert the calamity of future wars violates old habits of thought of the world over.

It is contrary to the conventional thinking of Americans a decade or more ago. It is still so new an idea that the reactionary influences in this country are very largely arrayed against it.

This year's campaign is to be decided by progressive, independent voters who desire a spokesman in the White House. This should mean, as Chairman White assumes, that the League of Nations will be endorsed in November.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.
