DOUGHNUTS!
There is nothing more wholesome and delightful than doughnuts or crullers rightly made.

Doughnuts
3 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon salt
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
Cream shortening; add sugar and well-beaten egg; stir in milk; add nutmeg, salt, flour and baking powder which have been sifted together and enough additional flour to make dough stiff enough to roll. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4-inch thick; cut out. Fry in deep fat hot enough to brown a piece of bread in 30 seconds. Drain on ungreased paper and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Crullers
4 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 cup milk
Cream shortening; add sugar gradually and beat in eggs; sift together flour, cinnamon, salt and baking powder; add one-half and mix well; add milk and remainder of dry ingredients to make soft dough. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4-inch thick and cut into strips about 1/4 inches long and 1/4-inch wide; roll in hands and twist each strip and bring ends together. Fry in deep hot fat. Drain and roll in powdered sugar.

"Constant Assault of Immigrants on English Language in America."

In the case of America there is one factor which, interesting enough, seems to point both for and against the promise of a great literary art developing. I mean the great and constant assault of immigrants on the English language in America.

They come from all over the world in great numbers there, bringing their own languages. In the fusion that comes of the native and the acquired languages English must suffer; just as in South America Spanish has degenerated to such an extent that I doubt if many of the literate people of the lower classes could read "Don Quixote" in the original.

In the United States and Canada, however, this assault on the English language has had nothing like that effect. On the contrary, I believe that the lower classes in America speak a purer English than the corresponding classes in England. Such an astonishing vitality in the language promises something, just as the assault on it threatens the opposite.

But then the Americans are an expressive people. So far from allowing such a splendid medium of expression as the English language to deteriorate they are enriching it with their own richness.

OHIO GLEANINGS

Will of W. H. Alms, Cincinnati merchant prince, who died recently, has been filed for probate. The entire \$6,000,000 estate is left to his three daughters.

Mrs. J. J. Doyle, president of the Toledo chapter of the Service Star Legion, asks for the adoption of a more simple and sensible dress for school girls.

Harry Herrman, a barber, was injured seriously at Lancaster when the bursting of an automobile tire which he was placing on a rim blew a portion of flesh from his right leg. Governor Cox in his Thanksgiving day proclamation urges observance of Nov. 25 as such in churches, schools, homes and elsewhere. He says the nation has prospered and that "we should thank Almighty God that the time has come when we may render an accounting to Him and to the world, so that, accepting the opportunity, free from all prejudices and differences as to means, we may lend all possible aid to the cause of righteousness and freedom."

Detroit, Toledo and Ironton roundhouse at Springfield, and which was recently improved, was damaged by fire to the extent of \$5,000.

Six wards will be added to Cleveland's list, providing one ward for every 25,000 population.

Mrs. Mildred Johnson, the mother of Albert Johnson, alias Joyce, who was killed while attempting to rob a bank at Bedford, was indicted at Cleveland, charged with receiving stolen property. Miss Helen Gray, alleged sweetheart of Johnson, also was indicted.

Managers and officials of the Ohio Independent Telephone association, meeting at Cleveland, declared there was little likelihood of telephone rates being reduced for several years.

Fire at Youngstown damaged the Albany hotel to the extent of \$20,000.

Mrs. Martha Diggs, 40, filed suit for a divorce from her husband, Andrew Diggs, at New Philadelphia, alleging that he beat her in an argument on election day over how she should vote.

Sixty-two passenger automobiles, 10 trucks, 2,500 cases of bonded whisky and 53 barrels of whisky, confiscated by the federal agents at Youngstown, were labeled by United States Marshal Charles Lapp and will be sold at auction soon.

Fred J. Metcalf, farmer, near Ash-tabula, dependent over the death of members of his family, killed himself.

Former Mayor and Mrs. C. F. McGilvray, Springfield, gave money for a new gymnasium at Wittenberg college.

Frank Coppeck, prominent Cincinnati attorney, is dead.

Andrew McNeal, negro, was arrested in connection with the death of Mrs. John Littlefield, negro, who died at Hamilton of injuries received when a lighted lamp was hurled at her.

Slackening in output of steel to 75 per cent of former production is due to lack of orders, Youngstown manufacturers state.

More than half the public schools of Tiffin, including the high school, were closed under orders of the board of health. The order, an outgrowth of the epidemic of smallpox, followed refusal of the city board of education to disregard certificates of vaccination by the "intercal" method.

James A. Reynolds of Cleveland will be the only Democratic member of the next Ohio senate, according to the roster prepared by the senate clerk's office.

James Roberts, 52, Wilmington, was fatally injured when a train hit his auto.

Centralized schools of Edinburg, near Ravenna, will close for lack of funds. Voters defeated a proposed 3-mill tax relief twice within the past year. Handolph schools may close for the same reason.

A small dog is credited with having saved the life of William Benson, 65, who was attacked by a bull near Port Clinton. Benson was hurled to the ground and trampled. The dog drove the bull away.

Congressman James T. Begg, Sandusky, is being booed for Republican whip in the house.

After Andrew Diggs of Uhrichville made a written apology in court, Mrs. Diggs dropped her suit for divorce, in which she alleged Diggs beat her because she voted the Republican ticket.

Charles Boltenhouse, 42, and Mrs. Flora Weldon, 38, were married at Chillicothe. It was Boltenhouse's third marriage and Mrs. Weldon's fourth.

Ed Pope, 33, Akron, was held under \$1,000 bond, charged with manslaughter, after Albert Hullwig, 28, died from drinking raisin jack containing wood alcohol, according to have been furnished by Pope.

William Campbell, 50, Toledo, was slow to obey a bandit's "hands-up" order and received a bullet wound in the back.

Mrs. Minnie Woolfert, 38, cut the throats of her two little daughters, Esther, 4, and Alice, 7, then threw their bodies into a cistern at their home in Bonn, near Marietta, and ended her own life by slashing her throat and jumping into the cistern.

Following the death at Ash-tabula of Steve Serpico, police are looking for the man they say fired two shots that caused his death.

Legislation is urged at Tiffin for the improvement of Rock creek through the city to eliminate the flood hazard.

Band of thieves plundered farm-houses in the vicinity of Hamilton. John Richards is in a serious condition from a fracture of the skull caused by falling down stairs at his home at Youngstown.

Aaron A. Ferris, 75, Newark attorney, is dead.
