Mr. Bloom had been under the surgeon's care about four months, part of the time in hospital in Omaha. For a while he had been able to be around the house and downtown, when suddenly in the evening of May 16 he was stricken with paralysis and rendered unconscious until 4 o'clock, May 18, when he passed away. He leaves his wife, two sons, Bernard F. and Myron J., five brothers, Frank of Canfield, Jacob of Falls City, Solomon of Verdon, George and Victor of Youngstown, and two sisters, Mrs. J. W. McDermott of Ellsworth Station and Mrs. J. B. Cook of Alliance, to mourn the loss of a devoted husband, father and brother. Mr. Bloom will be very much missed in the community, in the church, and in the lodge rooms, as he was highly esteemed by all.
