Instead of the trifling sum of \$9,000 it will cost the tax payers almost 900 millions, counting the time consumed in debate and actual money

appropriated. The Congressional Record from April 11th to July 11th will show that more than half of all the time of the three months' session was spent in debate on the army and navy, and that in the meantime we squandered three times as much public money on a big and useless army and an idle navy and miltarism than for all combined useful purposes. Evidently Miss Robertson has an idea that it is small things which center the attention of the common mind.
