The 131 democrats of the house have had up to date three caucusses of the new tax bill. I attended two of these caucusses to get a line on the democratic view of the new bill. The republicans claim that the bill reduces taxation some \$700,000,000. The leading members of the ways and means committee and the appropriation committee, on the democratic side, claim the reduction is not over \$500,000,000 figures prepared by treasury experts, that this bill, if enacted in its present form, would create a deficit of about \$700,000,000. This is a very fat sum of money. Of course this large sum would have to be appropriated by the next congress. Secretary of the treasury Mellon, a very capable business man of large affairs and great wealth. in an official report to congress estimated that it will be necessary this year to raise \$4,500,000,000 to meet the current expenses of the government and pay the interest on the public debt. This estimate of Secretary Mellon was based on the opinion of the financial experts of the treasury

and is probably correct. Then the question arises, why does congress adjourn for a month before the senate passes the tax bill, when the whole business interests of the country is being halted because business men, especially manufacturers, are waiting to know what the taxes are to be, in order to plan for the fu-No one in official life in Washington

believes that the house tax bill will pass the senate in its present form. I have talked with a number of senstors, and all agree that the senate will make a new bill and that the congressional recess of thirty days will postpone final action on the tax bill to the early days of November. A compilation of tax reductions made by expert republicans, which ap-

peared in the Washington Star of last evening, claimed the new tax bill will reduce taxation \$450,000,000 on the present excess profit tax alone; it claims the reduction will be \$80,000,000 on sur-tax rates on individual incomes and \$260,000,000 on transportation, freight, passenger and express taxes. raised on the increase of 2½% on incomes is estimated at \$133,750,000. It will not raise one-third of that amount, The estimate is made on the incomes of last year. Half the business firms and manufacturers who made profit last year, and paid income taxes, will make no profit this year, and consequently pay no income taxes.

This is indicated by that business barometer-the number of business failures in 1921 compared with 1920. They are more than twice as numerous and the liabilities more than twice as large.

This bill is intended to fool the people. Republican members expect to go home to their constituents with the claim that they voted for tax reduction, But wait for the senate before you form an opinion. It is a safe proposition that there will be no tax reduction without a deficit.

Here is an extract from the speech of Representative Oscar E.
