

## IMPROPER CONDUCT.

### Charged Against a Central High School Attache.

Girls of Tender Years Said to Have Been Grossly Insulted.

Janitor Christopher Volzer, aged Over Fifty Years, Calls at the News-Democrat Office, Admits He is the Man Charged, But Denies the Truthfulness and Says He Fondles the Children Out of His Great Love for Them—Some Victims.

Christian Volzer, janitor of the Central high school building, and residing at No. 77 West Fifth street, called at the office this afternoon in an indignant frame of mind. An article in Saturday's paper stating that an attache of the high school had been accused of immoral conduct toward girl pupils, and that an investigation would be made, was what Mr. Volzer took exception to.

Edith, the twelve year old daughter of Wesley S. Palmer, of No. 102 West Tuscarawas street, large for her age and a bright girl, in the presence of her mother told a reporter that the high school attache came upon her one day while she was hiding from a companion in the "dungeon," a basement room. He there held her and treated her outrageously. She gave the reporter a clear statement of his treatment. It is unfit for publication. Other insults were given her. She told her teacher but the teacher said there must be a mistake, the attache was an honorable man.

The second girl was Ermy, the twelve year old daughter of William Gibbs of No. 102 West Tuscarawas street, a charming girl. She had a similar experience with the attache. She told her story in a straightforward manner in the presence of parents. It also is not fit for publication.

Nettie, the young daughter of John Higgins of No. 137 Market street, was the third girl seen. She told her story also. It will not be given. It is similar to the others. She told it in the presence of her parents.
