CIRCUIT COURT OPENS.

The Maxwell Case Being Considered Today.

Able Arguments by Prosecutor Bow and Judge Critchfield—Other Cases Considered.

Circuit court opened in court room No. 1, Tuesday morning. Judges Aibaugh, Follet and Jenner were on the bench. The docket to be considered during this session is unusually large and the court will have a number of important cases to consider.

The case of Ohio against Lee Moon-shower, who is under sentence of 10 years for raping his little five-year-old niece, is one of the cases brought up on alleged error.

The attention of the court is directed towards the consideration of the Maxwell case. Judge Critchfield, of Wooster, is present in court Tuesday. He represents the defendants claim in an able manner. The case was brought up under alleged error of the court, and alleged misconduct on the part of Prosecutor Bow and his assistant John C. Welty. Judge Critchfield defined the position of the defense counsel. He made claims that, if substantiated and considered by the court, would be ample grounds for a new trial.

Prosecutor Bow, on the other hand, assailed the position taken by Judge Critchfield and submitted facts as they occurred during the trial. The position which Mr. Bow took was one which much argument will not overthrow. He was clear, concise, fair, blunt and at all times eloquent. His statement of the position taken by the state was listened to with the deepest attention. He had law at his command without reference and his plea was one which would hold the attention of any court.

The court adjourned at 12 o'clock and convened again about 1:30 o'clock. Mr. Welty took up the thread of the argument laid down by Mr. Bow and made a great plea in behalf of the state.

Following Mr. Welty, Mr. Pomeroy had a few facts and points of law which he desired to state. He addressed the court at length and made an exhaustive plea. His statement was replete with evidence, pregnant with facts and teeming with eloquence.

No decision has been reached.

TRAIN WRECKER JAILED.

A Man Charged With Wrecking a Train at Louisville Two Years Ago.

Sylvester Slusser was arrested Monday at Alliance for wrecking a train at Louisville two years ago. He was arrested by Marshal Gregory and Officer Chas. Slagle on information furnished by Detective Perkins of the Pittsburg agency. Slusser is now in jail in this city. He protests his innocence.

For this wreck two men named Sadler and Ryan respectively are serving time in the penitentiary. An application for the pardon of one of the men has been made to the Board of Pardons. If a case can be made against Slusser he will go down for a number of years, as the offense was an aggravated one.
