

A BIG DEAL PENDING. The DuBois Estate Under P. B. H. Conroy--A Coal and Lumber Region. DuBois, Pa., April 20.--A report is current here that the DuBois estate is about to pass out of the hands of John DuBois, Jr., who was made sole heir of the vast estate at the death of his uncle, which occurred some three years ago. Mr. DuBois has been in Philadelphia for the past week on this business, it is said, and the report, which has gained wide circulation, cannot be verified. The Pennsylvania railroad company is the purchaser, and the consideration named is reported to be about \$17,000,000 in all. When Mr. DuBois died he left the estate in trust to his nephew, John DuBois, to be operated on the same general plan which he had inaugurated for a period of twenty years, at the end of which time the property is to be divided up among the heirs. It is said that the provisions of the will permit of its disposal with the consent of the heirs, which, as is said, has been gotten, and the transfer is to be made, not to the railroad company as a corporation, but to individual stockholders of the company who see the advantages of securing control of such a vast amount of coal and timber land. There are about 28,000 acres of land in the tract, the greater portion of which is underlaid with coal. With the exception of perhaps 2,000 or 3,000 acres, the whole tract is heavily timbered, and it is without a doubt the most valuable piece of timber land in the state today that is owned by a single individual. On the property are three large mills, a box board factory and a machine shop with a large number of other improvements. Besides these, there is nearly the entire Third ward of this borough belongs to the estate. The annual output of manufactured lumber amounts to upward of 20,000,000 feet. The Low Grade division of the Allegheny Valley railroad, now under control of the Pennsylvania railroad, runs through the tract from east to west, while the Ridgeway and Clearfield, connecting with the Philadelphia and Erie at Johnsonburg, gives an outlet to the north. For some time there has been talk of extending this line from Fall Creek, where it connects with the Low Grade division, across to Curwensville to connect with the Tyrone and Clearfield branch. This would open a part of the DuBois tract, on Anderson creek, that has not yet been developed. There are thousands of acres of timber in the tract, which has never been touched, and the calculation of those well acquainted with the timber yet standing is that there is enough to supply the present capacity of the mills for the next twenty years. The citizens of this place are anxious to see the sale consummated, as they believe it means big developments for the town, as they believe the railroad company will make extensive improvements.

ZANESVILLE'S GALA DAY. Dedication of the Largest Tile Works in the World. ZANESVILLE, O., April 20.--The immense new works of the American Encaustic Tiling company, the largest of the kind in the world, covering forty acres of ground and employing 1,000 people, were dedicated yesterday with great eclat, under the auspices of the two leading benevolent societies of the city. Zanesville is gaily decorated, business is practically suspended and factories and schools are closed. The city is crowded with thousands of visitors from all over the state, and it is estimated that ten cents entitling them to admission to the exercises and festivities, the later of which are almost innumerable. Among the features of the dedicatory exercises yesterday, were the addresses of Mayor Hill, Governor McKinley, of Ohio, Colonel H. A. Blood, of Boston, and Colonel B. Fischer, of New York, president of the Tiling company. The festivities were continued throughout the evening, ending up with a grand charity ball and cake walk. The principal stockholders in the company are Colonel B. Fischer, Max Ames, W. G. Flammer, Andrew Blum and G. R. Lansing, of New York. The local members of the company are John Hoge, a capitalist and George Stanberry, inventor of nearly all the machinery used.
