

MAGIC AT HOME.

How to Lift a Glass of Water with the Open Hand. The problem in this case is to lift a glass nearly full of water, making it adhere to the palm of the open hand.



LIFTING A TUMBLER WITH THE OPEN HAND. The method is simplicity itself. Place the glass on the table and lay the palm of your hand over its mouth, holding down the four fingers at a right angle, as shown in the lower figure of the illustration (1).




A LIGHT SMOOTHING HARROW.

A Progressive Agriculturist Tells in The Ohio Farmer How to Make It.

The harrow I had made to suit me for a special purpose (harrowing corn—corn for ensilage being our main fodder crop), and it does so much better work and so much faster than any ready made drag I ever saw that I would not like to be without it.

The woodwork of this harrow is all of good, seasoned white oak painted three coats with Venetian red dry mixed in raw oil. The teeth can be made of old sully hayrake teeth three-eighths of an inch, or get 3/8-inch square steel and cut in 6-inch lengths and have sharpened, making teeth about seven inches long, and drive down even with top of beams.

I made out a bill of what I wanted and had it got out, and I put it together myself and my boy painted it. It is my own invention and no patent, so any one can use it.
