As supper time approached Mrs. Vogt entered the kitchen to prepare supper for her husband who is employed at Kibel & Co's shops.

Mrs. Vogt had been absent only a short time from the room when Mrs. Geckler saw the woman rushing wildly about with her hands burning and shrill screams emanating from her lips.

Mrs. Vogt ran about in the house and Mrs. Geckler chased after her attempting to catch her and throw some cloth around her.

In the intervening time two men named Jones and Romy ran into the house and succeeded in dashing water over Mrs. Vogt and in a few moments her burning clothes were extinguished.

It appears that Mrs. Vogt failed to turn shut the valves of gasoline as she refilled the stove and as she stood with a half gallon can of the explosive fluid in her hand pouring it through a funnel into the can attached to the stove, some of the fluid escaped down the side of the can and was ignited by the flames below, and they ignited Mrs. Vogt's clothing and burned her.

The clothing was almost entirely burned away and the flesh on her back, legs, face and hands was literally charred.

Dr. E. G. Meyers was summoned but his efforts to restore the suffering woman were of no avail and she died at 3:30 Tuesday.

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
