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STACY CASE.

THE CIRCUIT COURT SUSTAINS THE LOWER COURT.

Exceptions Taken and the Case to be Carried to the Supreme Court...

The Circuit Court this morning handed down its decision in the various cases heard this term of court.

The case of Thomas M. Stacy against the State of Ohio, carried up on error, was the most important in the assignment...

The case of Richard Wagner against the city of Canton, on error, the judgment of the lower court was affirmed...

The case of O. C. Brown vs. George Anthony, appeal, was reviewed by Judge Adams and the decree of the lower court was sustained.

The case of John Y. Williams et al. vs. Anson S. Springer et al., brought up on error, was reversed and the case remanded to the lower court for a new trial.

The finding of the Probate Court in the case of The State of Ohio vs. Catherine R. Hayden et al., on error, was affirmed, and it was remanded for execution of the sentence.

The decision of Common Pleas Court in the case of David A. Arter vs. Peter Geary et al., on error, was reversed and remanded for trial.

The judgment of \$600 given Robert Ray against the Miller & Wolcott Company, and brought up on error, was reversed by a majority of the judges and it was remanded to Common Pleas court for further action.

The motion to strike out interrogatories from the files in the appeal case of William G. Greer vs. Annie Klinger et al., was overruled.

The case of William H. Capper vs. A. H. Bair, was a small civil action from justice court on error. The decision of the lower court was affirmed.

In the appeal case of Joseph Meyer's trustees vs. James Phillips et al., on a demurrer to a reply the second part of the reply was stricken out and it will be heard in the next term of Circuit Court.
