GERMANY PREPARING

TO TAKE EXTREME MEASURES AGAINST NEW YORK LIFE

Revelations Made by Legislative Investigation Cause the Kaiser's Government to Get Busy.

Chicago, Dec. 27.—The Berlin correspondent of the Chicago Daily News says:

"There are indications that the German government is preparing for action against the New York Life Insurance Co. as soon as the present inquiry has exposed conditions thoroughly. The Kaiser's officials have a serious score to settle with President McCall's organization in consequence of the revelation that \$5,000,000 or \$7,000,000 in stocks, which the company had agreed to dispose of before beginning operations in the fatherland, were not really sold but were merely transferred for speculative purposes to one of the affiliated concerns which the New York Life used in such deals.

The New York Life is the only one of the "big three" at present operating in Germany. The Equitable and the Mutual refused to comply with the "humiliating provisions" of the German insurance law of 1901, and since they have only collected premiums and paid losses on old business. The German government, however, has found it necessary to apply the screws to the Equitable and the Mutual in the past few months by requiring them, under threat of seizure of their German properties to deposit the full amount of the premium reserves of their German policies. The Equitable's deposit, making a total of \$7,920,000 is about completed, but the Mutual has not yet acted in the matter.

Since the withdrawal of its two rivals the New York Life has done an enormous business in Germany, estimated at 200,000,000 marks (\$48,000,000) in new policies. Competing German companies are conducting a bitter campaign against the company.

KUBELIK COMING

The Celebrated Bohemian Violin Virtuoso to Be Seen at the Auditorium on January 11.

Kubelik, the celebrated Bohemian violin virtuoso, playing a programme rich in variety and attractive in each selection, is a magnet that will draw all genuine music lovers to the Auditorium on Thursday night, Jan. 11. The most sensational violinist of the century, the reincarnated Paganini, the genius who makes his instrument laugh, cry, sob, sing and command at will, the musician who sways his audiences as if they were part of his own spirit—being all this and more it is no wonder that Kubelik's tours in Europe and America alike have created furors of intensity that has never been surpassed, not even in the case of Paderewski. Kubelik is now at the fullness of his powers. When he first electrified America four years ago, he was little more than a boy. Now that he has reached maturity his musical puissance has increased four fold. From a prodigy he has developed into a master. Along with his marvelous technique has grown an interpretive power which enables him to reveal the inmost thoughts, to lay bare the deepest souls of the great composers. In fact, as well as being mechanically perfect on his instrument, he has earned the right to be called the spokesman of Beethoven, Bach, Mozart, Handel, Paganini, Ernst and Wieniawski—his magic violin is his voice, from its sounding board vibrates their feelings and emotions. Kubelik's programme for this city is well calculated to demonstrate the character of his gifts. Being alternately classic and romantic, it runs the gamut of sensations. Handel's sublime E major sonata No. 4, Beethoven's passionate Romance in G major, Ernst's beautiful Concerto Pathetique, Sarasate's rhythmic Eighth Spanish dance, and Wieniawski's richly-colored "Carnival Ruse" give him opportunity to touch the extreme capacity of the violin and of his own talent and achievement.

Well Known Bridge Manufacturer Dies After a Short Illness.

David Hammond, vice president of the Canton Bridge company, died suddenly at 4:45 o'clock Wednesday morning at his late residence, 1006 North Market street aged 75 years.

Mr. Hammond was born on the Keasey farm, North Market street extension. He married Margaret Henslein, who died Dec. 23, 1882. His second wife was Eva K. Mahon, who survives with six children, Geo. GUNBOAT CASSINI

Makes Ready for Sea With Extraordinary Speed and Sails Quietly.

Brest, Dec. 27.—The gunboat Cassini was made ready for sea with extraordinary speed and sailed yesterday afternoon "on a confidential mission."

Commander Schwere of the Cassini has sealed orders, which will not be opened until the vessel is twenty miles at sea.

The secrecy maintained is attributed to the desire of the French officials to adopt tactful means of executing a delicate mission, and it is generally understood that if necessity arises the Cassini will proceed to Russian waters.
