

HIRE TEACHERS

Anxious Applicants May Now Know Their Fate. Board of Education Transacts Much Important Business.

For the first time in a number of years the board of education held the election of teachers on the night appointed. After the "star chamber session," which lasted the best part of an hour, the members of the board came into the ante chamber, and started the business of the evening. Clerk Lane read his report: Tuition, \$6,032.08; contingent, \$4,574.70; building, \$29,526.98; sinking fund, \$1,234.84; total balance school treasury, \$41,369.60.

President Charles Duff, of the board of sinking fund commissioners, reported the paying of \$575, with interest due on 23 \$100 bonds issued to W. J. Hayes & Co., dated July 10, 1894, and payable to the Chemical National bank, New York, July 10, 1906; \$575 interest due on 23 \$1000 bonds, issued to Central Savings bank, dated Feb. 13, 1899, due and payable to Kountze Bros., N. Y., Aug. 13, 1906.

Superintendent's report of attendance: Total 6319; monthly, 6651; average daily attendance, 5257; per cent daily attendance, 913; tardiness, 239. Report of building committee: That \$5142.84 be paid J. L. VanKirk, for labor performed. That Kuehn Electric Co. be awarded contract of bell and annunciator equipment, for Crystal Park school. Contract amounting to \$51.90.

LOUISVILLE

Will Practically Close Up for Business Men's Annual Picnic—Some Street Improvement Proposed.

Louisville, O., June 4.—Great preparations are being made for the eighth annual picnic of the business men of Louisville which will be held at Cascade park at New Castle, Wednesday, June 13. Every store in the town will be closed on that day as everybody is going to the picnic. It is expected that at least 1500 people will compose the excursion that will leave Louisville on two trains. The arrangements are entirely in charge of the business men. A program of races of various kinds will also be arranged for. The trains leave Louisville at 7 o'clock and the second train only will stop at Maximo and Alliance. Returning the trains leave New Castle at 5:30 and 6:30, central standard time. Both of these stop at Alliance and Maximo returning.

Considerable talk and contention has been aroused concerning the curbing of Gorgas street. The property holders are heartily in favor of curbing the street and putting between the curbing and the sidewalk a 12 foot lawn, owing to the fact that the street is very wide. Petitions for and against this project have been circulated and from present indications the sentiment against the curbing of the street is the stronger.

It is thought that the council will deal with this matter in the near future. Members McCallum and Menegay of the council have been appointed as a committee to investigate the cost of putting in this curbing when they will report to the council.

At a recent meeting of the school board the teachers for the coming year were elected. The same old staff was again selected with the exception of Harley Guthrie, of Columbus, who was elected principal of the High school.

At a meeting of the township school board which was held Monday the text book proposition was dealt with by the members and the teachers to the various districts were assigned. COUNTY TAX

Levy Fixed by the County Commissioners—Total Amounts to 5.95—One New Levy.

The county commissioners met in regular session yesterday. The most important item of business transacted was the making of the county tax levy. The following is the levy on each and every dollar of real estate and personal property in Stark county:

County, 1.7 mills; judicial, 1 mill; poor, 1 mill; bridge, 1.1 mills; Children's home, 3 mill; buildings, 5 mill; workhouse and ag., 2 mill; interest and debt, 1 mill; state and county road, .2 mill; improvement public highway, 25 mill; election, 2 mill; soldiers' relief, .3 mill.

The total levy amounts to 5.95 mills. The only new levy was the one of .25 mills on improvement of public highway. Besides the making of the tax levy the commissioners approved of several bills and paid a number. The largest bill amounting to \$105.25 was paid to the township trustee of Tuscarawas township for the planking of the bridge at Brookfield.

FOR MURDER

In Second Degree Alliance Man is Being Tried—Judge Hole Did Not Arrive Yesterday as Expected.

Ciancinto Mannarino, of Alliance, is facing a charge of murder in the second degree before a jury of twelve men in Judge Ambler's court. Mannarino was indicted by the grand jury along with another Italian, Victoria Paola, for the murder of Alien Shriver at Alliance on November 15, last. Paola made his escape immediately after the murder and has not been apprehended. At the trial yesterday a number of witnesses were examined and some lively tilts on technical points engaged in between the state and the defendants' attorneys.

It is expected that the case will last during the greater part of the week. County Prosecutor Upham and Assistant Prosecutor Roscoe McCulloch represent the state, and Attorneys Welty and Albaugh are looking after the defendants' interests.

THE STATE BANK CASES.

Hole, of Salem, who was expected to be in Canton Monday to hand down his decision on the motions to quash the last indictments returned by the grand jury against three officials of the State bank and Harvey H. Miller, did not arrive. He has had these matters under consideration and it is expected that he will render his decision today or Wednesday.


