The 76th birthday of Mrs. Selinda Brockert was celebrated at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Peter Libba. The life long neighbors, Mrs. Julia Slabaugh, Mrs. Lucy Allen and Mrs. Elizabeth Wetzel, were present at the happy greeting.

To chat with a man who has lived almost a century in this vicinity is interesting. George Austin will be 100 years old if he lives till next October. He was foreman in the building of the Congregational church in Randolph, now the town hall, in 1831. The frame was of the best white oak, and the inside work of the best white wood. Ausman Coe, of Charlestown, hewed the timber, and hewed it almost as true as if sawed. Mr. Austin said that the building could be moved to Akron and not come to pieces. Jonah Hine was the contractor and Austin the builder. He worked for \$1.25 a day. No eight-hour day then; nor ten-hour day. The workmen began soon after daylight in

the morning, had breakfast between 7 and 8, an hour's nooning, then worked till dark. Saturday night they quit at 6, cleaned up the shop and burned the shavings. On one occasion, as Mr. Austin was about to light the fire, not with a match, but with steel and flint, as he said, he noticed a stir in the shavings. Ausman Coe, having had no work for a day or two, had imbibed too much and had crawled into the pile of shavings to rest. He was pulled out just in time to save him from being cremated. At that time there was a distillery near where Poole's mill now stands, and whiskey was sold at 20 cents a gallon. Mr. Austin says that his father-in-law, Bissell, brought the first barrel of salt into Rootstown. He brought it from Cleveland. Two poles were placed, one on each side of a horse and fastened to the pack saddle. The poles extended far enough in the rear so that the barrel was fastened securely between them. Mr. Austin has always been a hard worker. Old as he is, he has made and sold during the past winter, \$20 worth of cabinet ware, mostly foot-stools. Mrs. Carl Rogers, a grand-daughter, is authority for the statement that Mr. Austin never used liquor nor tobacco in any form.
