

NEWS OF COURTS

Trouble has been experienced in settling the affairs of the Heanor estate in the west end of the city. A partition of the estate was ordered and the sale was made by the sheriff, but the deeds did not give a complete description of the properties as some of the heirs believed necessary. The surveyor was called to make a plat of the land and establish the boundaries of the different lots beyond dispute.

BLOW, ANSWERING CURSE, CAUSES MAN'S DEATH

East Liverpool, O., Aug. 2.—Just as he was about to step into a buggy with a friend, intending to spend the day in the country, Thomas Lynch, twenty-four years old, stopped to hurl an epithet at Link Bows, who is said to have made a sneering remark, and received a blow over his heart that killed him instantly.

Bows later was arrested and is being held on a charge of murder. Lynch, formerly a potter, but lately employed at a restaurant, had just left the restaurant when Bows accosted him.

The two clinched and several passersby rushed in to stop the encounter. When the fatal blow was struck Lynch staggered directly into the arms of James Weston, a street commissioner, and died before he could utter a word.

An autopsy showed that Lynch had a diseased heart. Otherwise, it is said, the blow might not have been fatal. Bows disappeared, and when officers went to his home, several squares away, it is said he was preparing to leave town.

Bows, who is a huckster, came here six years ago from Cleveland, where, it is said, he has a police record.
