Extreme cruelty and absence for three years are the reasons why Helen Nunemaker wants a divorce from Norman Nunemaker. She asks that her maiden name, Helen Wilson, be restored. The parties were married in Canton February 5, 1895, and have no children.

SUES FOR BIG SUM.

Charles Steberling has brought suit for \$11,282.92 from William E. Shea and R. C. Roush, said to be due the plaintiff as part payment for 562 acres of land in Oglethorpe county, Ga.

GO TO LANCASTER.

Sheriff Frank Wilson took Tony Lane, thirteen, and Roy Jackson, thirteen, to the industrial school at Lancaster Wednesday.

The county commissioners will be represented by Prosecuting Attorney Krichbaum and Alice Pomeroy at the hearing of the mandamus suit brought by Harry C. Knobloch to compel the commissioners to fix his bond preparatory to his taking office. The hearing will occur at Mt. Vernon Thursday. Prosecutor Krichbaum will return to Canton from the East on Wednesday.

At the request of Assistant Prosecutor Pontius the term of probate criminal court, scheduled to open next Monday, has been postponed indefinitely, on account of the prosecution being too busily engaged with the Knobloch case to give probate matters their proper consideration.

BIG LIST OF CASES.

The bar list for the calendar term of court, which will be distributed next week, contains more than 700 cases. Together with the indictments laid over and new ones more than 800 cases will come before the courts at the next term.

CASE IS APPEALED.

The case of Harry Lohr against Jacob and Susan Elber was appealed from Squire Bethwell's court Friday. Justice Bethwell gave the plaintiff judgment in the sum of \$173.88.

A CHICKEN CASE.

The case of William Hump against Louis and Alice Nix, which had been tried in Squire Hump's court, was appealed to the common pleas court Friday. Squire Hump gave the plaintiff \$40 judgment for damages done his chickens by the defendants.

STONER FILES BOND.

Cyrus H. Stoner of Massillon, one of the commissioners, filed his bond with Treasurer Myer Friday. His bond is for \$5000, and is the second one filed for the incoming board of commissioners. Mr. Aker having qualified several weeks ago.

In a recent ruling, Judge Dickson of Cincinnati has decided that the county auditors and treasurers are entitled to their fees on the tax collections for the December, 1908, and June, 1907, assessments. The state tax commission previously ruled that about one-half of the fee belonged to the county instead of the officials owing to the inauguration of the new salary law. County Auditor Oberlin and others avowed discontent that they had expended much money to employ clerks and should, therefore, be entitled to the fee.

OFFICE IS CLOSED.

William Metzger, county treasurer, has closed his office for the next few days pending the completion of an examination of his books, being made by Leonard E. Aker of Canton and Joseph P. Dahl of Canton. The money in the county treasury has been counted, and the list of examiners went to Massillon Tuesday morning to examine the money in the banks there. Some county money is in the Alliance banks, though there is none at Canton.

GETS PAY FOR BOARD.

County Treasurer Metzger has received \$150 from Columbiana, Summit, and Jackson counties in payment for board of prisoners from those counties at the Stark county workhouse. The local workhouse is used by all four counties, including Stark, and is partially supported by regular payments from the outside counties.

DISTRIBUTING FUNDS.

Deputy Auditor Ralph Oberlin began making the semi-annual distribution of funds for the August tax settlement Thursday. The amount distributed for all purposes is \$24,196.99. The school fund is \$25,948.99, road funds \$31,022.56 and the poor funds \$8,377.38. The distribution analyzed follows: Corporations—Navarre, \$2,471.11; Canton, \$51,137.59; Canal Fulton, \$1,919.32; Alliance, \$42,284.29; Lima, \$18,936.25; Louisville, \$1,614.42; Osnaburg, \$1,947.23; Minerva, \$1,725.98; Massillon, \$48,192.35; New Berlin, \$79.15; Waynesburg, \$1,184.68; case on behalf of the commissioners. State Examiner Devies of Van Wert, who assisted in laying bare the scandal in the treasurer's office, is in the city to supply the prosecution with effective data.

LATE OHIO NEWS.

Bellfontaine—Mrs. M. J. Zahler, wife of a well-to-do farmer of Zelverton, drank carbolic acid with suicidal intent and probably will die. Wellston—By the explosion of accumulated coal dust used to fire the burners in the plant of the Alma Cement Co., Walter Hicks, twenty-eight, was fatally burned. Elyria—Officials of Mahoning county will be asked to take charge of John Best, who has been a prisoner at the county jail for a week since his capture in Brownhelm by a posse of farmers. Best was accused of stealing three horses. Investigation has satisfied the local probate court that he is not of sound mind. His home is in Youngstown. Sandusky—Ward Wilcoxen of Cambridge was held on a charge of assault in the mayor's court, the complainant being Harry Greene of Carey. Wilcoxen and Greene, both young men, took their girls to Cedar point for an outing. Wilcoxen says Greene jostled his (Wilcoxen's) girl intentionally and that he resented what he considered an insult. Cleveland—Charging that his dead wife's sister has obtained possession of his twelve-year-old son, Neil, W. S. Norton of Newmarket, Ont., obtained from Judge Aldams a writ of habeas corpus for the boy. Cincinnati—The first gun of a new "tobacco war" in Kentucky was fired when Clark & Scott, independent tobacco manufacturers of Scranton, Pa., filed suit in the federal court in Covington, Ky., against the Hurley Tobacco society, Clarence Lebus, the president and ten other men are defendants. Plaintiffs demand \$35,520 damages. Elyria—Indignant by farmers who threatened injunction unless their wishes were followed, Contractor H. J. Glover of Lorain has thrown up a contract to macadamize two miles of county road. Toledo—Accused of attacking an eight-year-old girl in Forest cemetery, Ed Bell, or Bellive, of unknown residence, was pursued by a crowd of residents of the neighborhood, and took refuge in a swamp. He was pulled out by the policemen. Sandusky—The annual joint institute of the teachers of Sandusky city and Erie county began here with a large attendance. The instructors are ex-state School Commissioner E. A. Jones of Columbus and Prof. W. W. Binek of the University of Indiana. Youngstown—John Pope of Ashland Harbor called at the police station with his arm done up in boards which he had used for splints. Pope fell downstairs while walking in his sleep and fractured his arm. Zanesville—In common pleas court Judge Frazier handed down a decision in which he sustained in every instance the mayor's court at New Concord in fifty-three liquor cases. Some time ago Mayor Campbell of New Concord handed out fines of \$200 each to fifty-three Zanesville saloonists. Fosteria—Her heavy hair saved the life of Mrs. George Micht of this city. On her way to Ft. Wayne she dropped her purse from the car and jumped off to get it, alighting on her head. She was badly bruised. Youngstown—The county commissioners have agreed to pay \$10,000 toward the erection of the Spring Common viaduct and to give the old bridge spanning the Mahoning river to the city. One of the most dangerous grade crossings in the city will be abolished when the bridge is completed. Cleveland—Nineteen arrests for counterfeiting were made during the past year in this secret service district, which consists of northern Ohio and Michigan, according to the annual report of the secret service branch of the treasury department just received here by Secret Service Operative P. C. Dick. Youngstown—Rumor has it that a fifteen-story hotel building will be erected on the present site of the Todd House by local capitalists. A new vaudeville house also is to be erected by the same interests and may be made part of the new hotel building. Delaware—Harry Cleveger, an Ashley undertaker, is in a dangerous condition as a result of blood poisoning contracted while he was engaged in embalming a corpse. Cleveland—Sitting in the chair in which he spent his nights because of the cough that racked him, John Clague, nightwatchman, Collinwood, died some time in the early morning. When his two boys, twelve and fourteen, rose they found his body.

KILLED ON HER WEDDING DAY

Shot By Man She Had Promised to Marry But Rejected. Old Love Returned. By Sun Leased Wire. Crisfield, Md., Aug. 31.—Murdered on the day set for her wedding and at the hands of the man she had promised to marry and whom she had rejected to be reunited to her former husband was the fate of Mamie Gunby, daughter of J. H. Gunby, who was shot and instantly killed by her lover, Isaac J. Waters, at St. Paul's camp meeting last Sunday. Five years ago Mamie Gunby, then 16, married Joseph Roley, from whom she got a divorce in less than a year. The girl returned to her home and resumed her maiden name. Isaac Waters, who was an old sailor, began to press his attentions again and met with favor. After three years of courtship the young woman consented to become Waters' wife and the wedding day was set for last Sunday. Saturday morning Miss Gunby arrived at the camp and on the evening of that day was met by her prospective husband. Joseph Roley also arrived at the camp meeting and was informed of the proposed marriage. He attempted to effect a reconciliation with his divorced wife. Finally, finding her love for her divorced husband the stronger, the woman renounced Waters and told him that the wedding planned for the next day would not be solemnized. Waters thereupon killed her and escaped.

Elyria—Hugh Wick steel manufacturer, has returned from the Moon river district in Canada with the record of catching the largest small-mouth black bass captured in those waters for five years. Mr. Wick's capture weighed five and one-half pounds. Moreover, it was taken on Friday, the 13th of August.

We find the amount of cash in vault and deposited in the different banks to be correct as per itemized statement hereof. In explanation of the overdraft shown on the statement we wish to say, the examination having been made just prior to the August distribution of the June collection of taxes, the accompanying statement shows an overdraft in a number of funds aggregating \$29,254.42. This amount is now in the undivided general, liquor and cigarette tax funds, all of which will be distributed to the various funds and taxing districts, which funds will then show credit balance instead of overdraft. In explanation of the overdraft shown on the statement we wish to say, the system instead of the old receipt system formerly in use in the Treasurer's office, which system will, in the opinion of your committee, meet in an admirable manner the modern requirements of an office, both in the saving money by the officials and assistants in and avoiding annoying delays to tax payers in the payment of their taxes. In our opinion it will mean a reduction of three or four assistants in the office and mean a saving of practically \$500.00 per year on printing. MRS. THAW SAYS LAWYER SHORT CHANGED HER

By Sun Leased Wire. New York, Aug. 31.—That Clifford W. Hartridge retained \$46,815.02, which he claims to have spent on the money she had given him, is the charge contained in the counter claim of Mrs. Mary C. Thaw, widow of Harry Thaw, which was filed today in the United States circuit court before Judge LaCombe, where the lawyer is suing for \$92,636.21, which he claims he owed him for his services during the Thaw trial. Mrs. Thaw, in her counter claim, says that she paid the lawyers \$102,652.76, but that Hartridge personally obtained from her the sum mentioned in her counter claim, and which he told her had been spent in her son's behalf. This, she declares, was not the case, and she has been informed that Hartridge kept the entire amount. Judge LaCombe has ordered Mrs. Thaw to furnish Hartridge a full bill of particulars regarding her counter claim.

NAME SUCCESSOR TODAY

George Bissel Will Probably Be Selected to Take Place of Commissioner Hay. At the regular session of the county commissioners, this morning a successor will be chosen to Commissioner Hay to fill out his unexpired term of office. A. L. McDonald, the only active member left of the old board, will make the choice with the assistance of the recorder, auditor and probate judge. George Bissel will probably be chosen, since he was regularly elected last November to the office and would be ushered into office September 20, anyhow. WOMAN A MURDERESS.

Dallas, Tex., Aug. 31.—(Spl.)—K. R. Flannery, chief of the registry division of the Dallas postoffice, died this afternoon from wounds inflicted by his wife last Saturday, when she shot him down on the street. Mrs. Flannery is in custody. Liberian Port Opened. London, Sept. 1.—(Spl.)—The Times announces that the president of Liberia has just declared the port of Grand Coss open to foreign trade.
