ALLIANCE

(Staff Special.) Alliance, O., Dec. 7.—Milton Freed of Alliance died Tuesday at Cleveland from tumor of the heart. He was 23 years of age and a boiler-maker by trade. He was survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Freed of Lima view and the following brother and sisters: Harry Freed, Mrs. Cora Godfrey and Mrs. Florence Miller. The funeral services and burial will take place at Cleveland.

Erected Monuments. Dr. Charles E. Rice of this city, accompanied C. E. Hudson to Hanover Monday where granite monuments will be erected upon the graves of Dr. Rice's great-grandparents and great-grandparents. The monuments of these dates back to 1750. The bodies are buried in the Sandy Spring cemetery, one mile from Kensington, originally used as a burying ground by the Delaware Indians. The church at the place was built in 1827.
