Valentine Law Can Bust the Food Trust

PAULHAN HAS THE RECORD IN AVIATION

Reaches an Altitude of 1000 Feet Higher Than Best Record.

HEIGHT OF 4165 FEET

Daring Feat of the Frenchman Applauded by Large Crowd.

SPECIAL TO THE NEWS. Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 12.—Louis Paulhan, French aviator, late this afternoon broke all world's records for altitude, reaching the height of 4165 feet.

Shortly after 4:30 Paulhan, unannounced appeared from near the aeroplane tent and flew directly past the grand stand at a height of about thirty feet and with a low bow and sweep of his arm he lifted the nose of his aeroplane in the air. The crowd knew that this was to be an attempt for height and cheered the daring "bird man." Round and round the course he went, each time going higher. After he reached an altitude of 1000 feet the announcer began giving the elevation.

"Fifteen hundred feet," was the first call that aroused the crowd. "Two thousand feet," and they shouted wildly. From that time on enthusiasm was at a high pitch and when the announcer cried: "Paulhan is now at 3200 feet, the world's record," the crowd went mad. Paulhan soared higher and higher. Before he began his descent the announcer had shouted through his megaphone, "Four thousand six hundred feet." It was announced officially later as 4165 feet.

TO INVESTIGATE FOOD COMBINE

Action of Governor Harmon Stirs Cold Storage Men.

TRUST FRIENDS BUSY

Columbus, O., Jan. 12.—Immediately following the reading of Governor Harmon's message urging the legislature to probe the high cost of living, Senator Beatty presented a resolution calling for the appointment of a joint committee of the senate and house whose duty it shall be to make a thorough investigation of conditions as they exist throughout the state and report to the legislature what steps are necessary to prevent the further imposition of heavy burdens on the people by food combines, if it is found that the rapid increase in the cost of all articles is due in whole or in part to combinations on the part of commission men, jobbers and retailers.

The cold storage men are already coming in to see the legislators and in the state house itself are protesting the uselessness of any investigation. Letters coming in to legislators from merchants who handle the produce and who are usually men of influence, politically and financially in their communities.

JACK JOHNSON IS ARRESTED

Colored Pugilist Overstepped the Automobile Speed Law.
