ALLIANCE

(Staff Special.) Alliance, O., March 8.—The Alliance board of education has accepted the offer of J. Stanley Smith, who has offered the free use of the Columbia theater for the annual commencement exercises of the high school to be held June 9. It is likely that President W. H. McMaster, of Mt. MASSILLON

(Staff Special.) Massillon, O., March 8.—G. Leonard Schmidt, eighty-eight, one of the oldest residents of Stark county, and a leader of the Home Guard, the band of citizens which was formed to defend Massillon against the possible invasion of John Morgan's raiders when they were headed this way during the Civil war, died this morning of old age at his home here.

Schmidt was one of the men who received the news that Morgan was at Lisbon headed for Massillon. Most of the people were in church at the time and like Paul Revere he went to the various churches and alarmed the populace. Armed with pitchforks and every other sort of weapon, the Home Guard assembled and under Schmidt's command waited for the raiders who never came.

Schmidt was born in Germany and came here in 1847.

Sealer of Weights and Measures. Councilman Adrian Howard, the only Democrat in the city council, is preparing for introduction of an ordinance which it is expected will be the most popular submitted for enactment in many years. It will create the office of sealer of weights and measures and establish a public scales, which, Councilman Howard believes, will safeguard the people against the loss of thousands of dollars annually at the hands of unscrupulous dealers. Daily complaint regarding the alleged short weight served by certain coal dealers and retail grocers is heard. At present the citizens have no way of protecting themselves. Howard has called City Solicitor Davis to his assistance in preparing the proposed legislation.

Mary J. Byers will not be obliged to pay her brother-in-law, Amos Ayers, \$100.00, which he claimed was due on a promissory note, with interest, contracted in 1890. A jury before Judge Harter in common pleas court Tuesday afternoon decided in favor of the defendant. The petition requested a vacation of the judgment and was filed by the defendant, Mrs. Mary J. Byers. The case presented a number of interesting complications.

BREWING COMPANY SUES. Three separate items are included in a law suit filed by the Heracourt Brewing company against Anne Davis in the court of common pleas Tuesday afternoon. The first cause for suit is a promissory note for \$490, dated Feb. 11, 1907, and due in three years. For this the defendant gave a mortgage. The second cause amounts to \$300 taxes which the brewing company paid for the defendant in May, 1908. The last item amounts to \$71 and is an unpaid bill for liquor. The plaintiff company asks for the total including interest on all three amounts and the costs of the case.
