Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Canton, State of Ohio, three-fourths of all members elected thereto concurring.

Section 1. That it is hereby determined to proceed with the improvement of East Fourth Street and the Georgetown Road from the first alley east of Schwalm Street to Belden Avenue, by grading to the established grade, setting curbing, constructing sawed stone sidewalks and vitrified block crosswalks.

Section 2. That the total assessment against each lot shall be payable in cash within thirty days of the date of the annual passage of this ordinance, or in five annual installments with interest at the rate of four and one-half per cent per annum upon deferred payments, at the option of the owner.

Section 3. Be it ordained by the council of the City of Canton, State of Ohio,

Section 1. That to pay the portion of the cost and expense heretofore determined to be specially assessed for the improvement of Sherrick Avenue from Cherry Street to Gunder Avenue, by grading to the established grade, setting curbing, constructing sawed stone sidewalks and vitrified block crosswalks and providing the necessary drainage, as reported to the Council on the 21st day of February, 1910, by Willison F. Gauchat, Joseph Quinn and Joseph Kaufman, an estimating board heretofore appointed by the Council of the City of Canton, Ohio, and recorded in Vol. 15, page 409 of the Code of the City of Canton, Ohio, that there be levied and assessed upon the lots and lands described in said report, the several amounts therein set forth, which it is hereby determined and declared by this body are in proportion to the benefits accruing to the property assessed.

Section 2. BRYAN'S LETTER APPROVED

Friends In Washington Like His Jefferson Anniversary Sentiments

O. K. SAYS CLARK

Washington, April 13.—Bryan's letter to his Jeffersonian friends in Washington will not be "blue-penciled."

The committee in charge of tonight's Jefferson day banquet, after canvassing the situation and receiving the O. K. of Champ Clark, has decided to read the letter in its entirety. Objection has been raised because of references by Bryan to the issues of 1896. Some even expressed doubt as to the authenticity of the letter.

A copy of the letter written from Brazil became public prematurely today. Bryan says:

"I am so far away from home that I am not fully informed as to the recent events, but I have just read of one Jeffersonian victory, namely, the selection of an investigating committee by the house instead of by the speaker, and, better still, each party selected its members of the committee.

"I notice also that we seem likely to win a victory against the meat trust. Monopoly prices have at last provoked a popular protest and now that the people are looking for a remedy there is hope that they will accept the democratic remedy. \* \* \* I am sure they will, in the end find legislation more satisfactory than abstinence from the meat and join with the democrats in declaring a private monopoly—not the meat trust only, but every private monopoly—indefensibly and intolerable.

"President Taft in his Lincoln speech at New York February 12, attributes present high prices mainly to the increase in the production of gold and the consequent enlargement of the volume of money. This unexpected endorsement of our party's position in 1896 when we demanded more money as the only remedy for falling prices, is very gratifying. How valuable that admission would have been to us if it had been made during the campaign of that year when the Republican leaders were denying that the volume of money had any influence on prices, and asserting that it did not matter whether we had much money or little, provided it was all good.

"We may now consider the quantitative theory of money established beyond dispute and proceed to the consideration of other questions. But the president and his predecessor have admitted the correctness of the Democratic position on so many questions that I am sure they will not deny it now. \* \* \* I am sure they will, in the end find legislation more satisfactory than abstinence from the meat and join with the democrats in declaring a private monopoly—not the meat trust only, but every private monopoly—indefensibly and intolerable.
