FOREIGN NEWS. Arrival of the Atlantic. New York, May 14.—The steamer Atlantic from Liverpool the 4th, arrived here this morning.

In the English Parliament the financial debates continued. The motion regarding the continuance of the income tax was repudiated by seventy-one majority.

Mrs. Stowe was the guest of the Dutchess of Sutherland, and had dined with a distinguished party of judges &c. A meeting had been called at Greenwich to encourage Kossuth.

Alex. Humbolt and 1000 citizens of Berlin have petitioned the King of Prussia to remove Jewish disabilities. Two Cantons of Switzerland have formerly notified the federal Swiss Government that they will not give up refugees.

Freiburg is in a state of siege; all quiet; 130 insurgents retained in custody. Turkey.—As little as ever is known of Menchikoff's negotiations, but all agree in expecting it is coming to peaceful solution.

From Richardson & Bro's circular of 31st—since 29th ult., the weather has been occasionally more genial than in the preceding week. Our market has not presented any feature from our report of it at the above date.

In the House of Commons on Tuesday evening the government was asked whether any directions had been given authorizing the Postmaster to open letters of foreign refugees.

Lord Palmerston denied that any such letters had been opened. The inquiry was supposed to be in reference to Kossuth's recent complaint. Three ships arrived at London with over \$3,000,000 in gold from Australia.

Latest news.—The Diario Espanol says Santa Anna has routed and from Spain to repel an anticipated filibuster expedition from the United States.

The Buffalo Accident. Buffalo, May 14.—Search for bodies of the men buried in the ruins was continued all night by torch light. Six dead bodies have been recovered, and eight persons by Hydrus have been got out.

A large body of men are still at work, and several bodies are supposed to be beneath the ruins. A man can be heard talking and he will be got out soon.

Up to 8 o'clock last evening seven persons were taken from the ruins. Two of them were dead, some injured but slightly, others it is feared fatally, while one was a mere mass of lifeless humanity.

It is presumed that from six to ten more corpses are to be found. About 4 o'clock this morning another person was taken out dead and horribly mangled.

At 7 this morning a man was taken out alive but quite dead. Counterfeit quarters of the new stamp are in circulation in Cincinnati.

SANTA ANNA has appointed the Senor ALMONTE Mexican Minister to this country. Mr. ALMONTE formerly had that station during the Annexation of Mr. Tyler and Mr. Polk, and opposed the annexation of Texas to this country with great warmth and zeal.

He has never been friendly in his feelings to our Government, and his appointment is a significant one upon the part of SANTA ANNA.

A Boat Burned. The Memphis Eagle learns from passengers on the Memphis that the steamer Hiram Powers caught fire while lying at Marshall's wool-yard [about 3 miles below Grand Chain, on the Wash-burn river] and was burned nearly to the water's edge before she was scuttled.

She was loaded principally with bulk meat, and both boat and cargo were insured. Lieut. James Watson has been ordered to command of the United States steamer Fulton, now fitting out at Norfolk, whence she will again sail in perhaps a week to join the Gulf squadron.

Air as a Motive Power. We notice in some of our exchanges, that the common atmosphere unheated, has been successfully applied as springs to railroad cars by condensing in a cylinder perpendicular under the cars with a piston inserted in the cylinder for the car to rest on, thus making the elasticity of the condensed air serve as a spring, not only, but that in Paris the atmosphere condensed in cylinders, and attached to carriages, has been made to answer the purpose of a motive power, to propel them on common roads at a comparatively trifling expense. It is suggested to have depots for cylinders really charged with air at convenient points along the road, where the traveler can exchange those from which the air has been expelled for others ready for use.
