HARKNESS CHOSEN.

On the Three Hundred and Sixty-Second Ballot Senator Harkness of Clay County, is Selected for State Senator.
Special to REFLECTOR. CLAY CENTER, Sept. 4th—The convention last night took five ballots and adjourned without a choice. On the second ballot this morning Judge Culbertson, of Abilene, voted for Harkness thus nominating him for Senator from the 23d district.

The Clay Center Contest.

The result of the Senatorial convention, while not what the citizens of our county would have desired, is yet eminently satisfactory to the Republicans generally. Our county had a candidate before that convention. So had Clay. Each candidate had eight votes. For 361 times the delegates had stood by their candidate. They might have continued to ballot in the same way until the evening of November 6th and still have been no nearer a nomination than when they organized at Industry. Longer delay in the matter would have been injurious to the prospects of anyone the convention might have named. It was eminently proper that the deadlock should be broken. It would have pleased Dickinson better had some delegate from Clay been the man to change his vote, but the Clay county delegates stood firm. No new candidate was suggested by anyone and it became simply a question of physical endurance. And taking everything into consideration we believe that Mr. Culbertson acted wisely and in the interests of the Republican party when he broke the deadlock and nominated Mr. Harkness. Mr. Harkness is well qualified both by ability and experience for Senator. He is one of the leading lawyers of the

Clay Center bar. He has been Senator for four years and has a large acquaintance with public men and measures. His triumphant election will place the interests of this Senatorial district in safe hands.
