-In a decision against the Kansas Farmers Fire Insurance company the supreme court has just decided that "where a dwelling house is insured and the policy by mistake, misdescribes the land on which the house is situated this will not of itself affect the risk, or render the policy void and it is not necessary to reform the policy in case of a loss to recover thereon."
-A large life like photograph in Forney's show case which attracts much attention and is greatly admired is that of Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Troxel, two of Dickinson's popular and handsome young people. It is evident that Mr. Troxel knows a good thing when he sees it and a couple that starts out with such good literature in the family cannot help prospering.

-A letter just received from Capt. Wm. Waring, with whom REFLECTOR readers have become acquainted through his excellent letters to this paper, tells of the burning of his ship while passing through Suez canal, Nov. 1. The ship was loaded with sugar and was proceeding through the canal by electric light when it was found to be on fire. Although fire boats filled the hold with water the ship continued to burn like coal and was destroyed. Capt. Waring lost all his clothing, instruments and many valuable curios which he was taking home. He will probably take charge of another vessel.

A NAIL IN HER HEAD.

Two Inches of Iron Inside a Woman's Skull for Six Weeks.

'People have all sorts of things in their heads. A goodly portion of the population is frequently accused of having "wheels" in their heads. Then there are hobbies, sensible and otherwise, crank notions, Populist ideas and other folk things that get inside of craniums but an Abilene woman who has been carrying around a six-penny nail inside her skull for six weeks and lives to tell the story rather leads the procession up to date.

The performer of this remarkable feat is Mrs. Frank Roadson, mother of Mrs. L. L. Merrifield, who is aged 68 years and resides with Mr. and Mrs. Merrifield on North Fifth street. About six weeks ago a physician was called to see her, she being apparently suffering from paralysis or some kind of trouble. One side seemed deadened and no amount of will power on her part could cause normal action. Electric batteries were applied repeatedly and efforts were made to induce the paralyzed nerves to act once more but with little avail until Wednesday when the physician thinking perhaps better results might be attained ordered her thick hair cut off. She objected, but it was done and on examination a sore spot with the head of a nail embedded therein was found upon the very crown of her head. An operation was performed and to the surprise of all a six penny nail, two inches long, was removed. It had penetrated straight into the brain its full length and an abscess had formed upon the brain because of its presence there. Yesterday another operation was performed, the abscess was removed and the patient is getting along well, apparently about to regain full control of her muscles.

Remarkable as the above is, and such a series of events with such results is perhaps unparalleled in medical history, the cause of the nail being embedded in the woman's skull is as odd. When it was discovered she stoutly denied knowing how it came there. This position seemed a little unusual as she had apparently not been born with the nail in her head, but it took considerable questioning to make her confess. At last she admitted that the day before the physician was first called she had herself driven the nail into her skull, pounding it down with a stone for the express purpose of ending her life. By a rare piece of fortune and because of an unusual arrangement of the blood vessels of her head the nail penetrated a spot which, allowed of its entrance without severing any important organs. The chance was, however, too slight one to be easily attained and there is no probability that that manner of storing hardware will become popular.

THEY FAILED TO FILE.

Candidates for Township Officers Did Not Report Expenses.

Something like 200 citizens of Dickinson county are liable to arrest for violation of what is known as the Douglas election law. Among the provisions of the law is one making it obligatory that every candidate for office shall within a specified time after election file a sworn statement of his campaign expenses with the county clerk. That time expired on the 8th inst. The penalty provided is a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$500, or a jail sentence of not less than ten days or more than six months.

County Clerk Nottorf said today that although all candidates for county offices had complied with the law not more than one half the candidates for township offices had filed their bill of expense. Those who did make a statement almost uniformly report no money spent, as the tickets were printed at county expense and there was hardly inducement in a township office to warrant any elaborate efforts to secure it. Doubtless many of the little army of ex-candidates considered that as they spent nothing in the campaign they had no "bill of expense" to file. There is a whole lot of sense in such a view of the case. The law is altogether too rigorous in some directions and the difficulty in enforcing it will result in its becoming to some extent a dead letter. Even in this, its first trial in the State, it has probably not been carried out fully in regard to township officers in a single county in Kansas.

In every one should some one start to enforce the law the treasurer's vault would either get a large contribution or the jail would be filled to overflowing, unless the law could be broken in the courts.

I can loan a million dollars in Burlington and get it all back; or I can loan a million dollars and never get a cent back; the same rule applies to Kansas."

The other is from F. M. Bandl, one of the leading dealers in securities in New York City. He says: "If you own, or are likely to control from time to time, good municipal bonds (city, county, school, etc.) I would like to arrange with you for making the offerings of them in the eastern markets generally."

"That is the kind of talk that Kansas wants to hear and which she will hear right along under Republican rule."

How Kansas City is Coming on with Its Waterwork Fight.

One step in Kansas City's waterworks fight is taken and the opposers of settlement can "point with pride" to the result.
