

FIRST OF THE LOT.

The Barr Whisky Case in Court—Jury Selected. [From Wednesday's Daily.] The first of the Whisky cases, that of State vs. Barr, was on trial in district court all day, the jury going out at 3 o'clock. There was considerable difficulty in selecting a jury and all challenges were exhausted when only eleven were secured.

The sheriff then added Simon Rothschild, making the jury: C. Stevens, F. Volkman, W. Lewis, A. D. Sauer, F. Huff, H. W. Rhodes, C. Ziebell, F. Bieher, A. H. Smith, L. B. Campbell, J. M. Shuey, S. Rothschild. Some strong evidence was produced.

The jury after being out about three hours returned a verdict of guilty on two counts which means 60 days in jail and \$200 fine, and costs which amount to about \$150. The defendant made a hard fight and the victory was a decisive one for County Attorney Smith.

A motion was filed to set aside the case against Lenze and Barr for bond forfeited by Barr's absence when wanted last fall.

The remainder of the whisky cases will come on tomorrow after which will be the Crawford case.

National Bank Call.

Word was received by President Hollinger of the Abilene National today that the comptroller has made a call for a statement of all National banks' condition at close of business May 4.
