## Appendicitis

Chiropractically Considered

We not infrequently hear the remark made that such methods may be quite useful in some cases, but they would not care to take the risk of employing spinal adjustments in a case of appendicitis. It is just such a case, where its employment will be followed by the most brilliant results. Let us admit there is a foreign body in the appendix, that despite the efforts of the muscular walls to expel, the offending substance still remains, setting up irritation, inflammation, and subsequent suppuration. Foreign matter had passed that point of the intestinal tract perhaps for years, and not until the nerve current was cut off more or less completely, did trouble occur, the appendix had, up to that time, successfully protected itself from invasion. As it takes but half a minute to adjust the vertebrae responsible for the entire trouble, why not use the simpler, and more direct method first, and resort to surgical procedure afterwards, should it be necessary. Certainly no time has been lost, and the risk of the operation would have been eliminated.

In the light of the recent discovery of Sir William McEwen, the removal of the appendix should be considered only as a derrier-resort. Sir William has performed more operations for appendicitis than any other surgeon in England, and has become so thoroughly convinced of the usefulness of the appendix, that he no longer removes it. By watching the activity of the appendix, he discovered a clear, thick, alkali fluid poured from it into the colon, this secretion, when added to the pancreatic juice, dissolves the white of an egg in from three to ten minutes. The pancreatic fluid alone took six hours to dissolve it; thus we see how important a part the appendix plays; its removal should never be attempted unless all other means fail.

Surgeons as a rule are poor diagnosticians, and frequently mistake lumbo-abdominal neuralgia for appendicitis. Lumbo-abdominal neuralgia involves the six branches of the lumbar plexus. This condition is speedily relieved by adjustment of the vertebrae in the lower dorsal or lumbar region, the exact vertebra being determined by discerning the points of tenderness usually situated in the region of the transverse processes.
