Douglas, Ariz., Nov. 1.—Private telegrams received here from the City of Mexico say Carranza is reported to have prepared and probably will issue in a few days a decree placing the Mexican monetary system on a "Mexican gold" basis of two pesos Mexican money for one American dollar.

Washington, Nov. 1.—A Republican majority in the next house of at least twenty-seven is predicted in a statement issued here by Representative Woods of Iowa, chairman of the Republican congressional campaign committee.

WILSON'S OPINION OF LABOR

Key Score of Laboring Men When He Was Not Running for Office

The President's Own Words: "The objections I have to labor unions is that they drag the highest man to the level of the lowest."—Woodrow Wilson.

"The labor of American is rapidly becoming unprofitable under its present regulation by those who have determined to reduce it to a minimum."—Woodrow Wilson.

"Our economic supremacy may be lost because the country grows more and more full of unprofitable servants."—Woodrow Wilson.

"You know what the usual standard of the employee is in our day. It is to give as little as he may for his wages."—Woodrow Wilson.

"Bricklayers sitting around one-third of the day . . . because they had laid number of bricks to which they were limited for the day by the union."—Woodrow Wilson.

"Impossible on cold evening to get window pane mended because prescribed labor hours of day were over, and glazier could not venture without making strike to do work himself."

FOUR BANDITS EXECUTED BY CARRANZA FORCES

Chihuahua, Oct. 28.—Four Villa bandits captured at the Babecora ranch Wednesday morning by Carranza forces have been summarily executed, an official report to General Trevino stated. They were Maj. Juan Marrazo, who is commander of the bandits, Capt. Perfeto Lopez, second in command and two privates.

Villa deserters brought here report many desertions from Villa commands and say the bandit chief is short of supplies.
