French market gardeners cultivate the dandelion and sell large quantities at good prices.

The Bank of England destroys about 350,000 of its notes every week to replace them with freshly printed ones. One evening in each week is set apart for the making of this bonfire.
Commendatore Bodio, an Italian statistician, has computed from the railroad returns of passengers that the foreigners who visit Italy spend 306,000,000 francs a year in the country.
Norwegian legislators propose that girls who do not know how to knit, sew, wash and cook, should be refused permission to marry. Daughters of wealthy men are not to be excepted.
The latest test for sobriety is a word of twenty-three letters. It is electro-photomicrography, and the meaning given is "photographing by electric light objects magnified by the microscope."—Pittsburg Dispatch.
English engineers are making commendable progress in burning garbage as fuel for electric light stations. At Canterbury, England, fifteen tons are burned in twelve hours under a forced draft. This process is in use at several places.
Water is delivered gradually to the roots of plants by a new flower-pot collar, which is made of porous material, fitting around the edge of the pot and extending down inside nearly to the bottom, being filled with water to moisten the roots by percolation.
A tank of chloride of potash recently exploded in a factory in Lancashire, England, with disastrous results. As the substance is not combustible in itself, although a powerful aid to combustion under some circumstances, the disaster is not easy to account for.
The Eiffel tower is being put in readiness for the exposition. It is to be given a coat of enamel paint in five shades, graduated from lemon carmine on the summit to deep orange on the pedestal. Two coats will be applied, for which nearly fifty tons of enamel will be required.
