### Experiment Station Notes.

The Country Gentleman magazine, in a letter to the Superintendent under date of April 29th, says that they will send a representative here soon to write up the Fort Hays Experiment Station and Western Kansas. Nearly all of the leading farm papers of the middle west and west have in the last few weeks, carried articles and pictures of the live stock and other work at Hays.

Mr. R. E. Getty, the Forage Crop expert, and Mr. Clarence Clark, the Experimental Gardener, accompanied Mr. Lewis Keeler of the Fort Hays Normal on an extended auto trip over southern and western Kansas.

The Experiment Station this week, registered an official brand for use with the Station cattle. The brand is S, which stands for Station and State; any sized "S" on the right cheek, without bars or with any number of bars in any position. The use of bars enables the Station to vary the brand sufficiently to keep a permanent record on all cattle used in the different experimental pens.

Mr. John R. Chittenden and his Committee, spent sometime this week at the Experiment Station perfecting plans for the big Farmers' Union Picnic to be held here, May 24th.

Dr. Goss of the Kansas State Agricultural College Veterinary Department, spent a few days here and over the cattle section, south and west of here, investigating contagious abortion that has wrought such havoc among the cattle this year in western Kansas.

Mr. Alex and "Bill" Philip took Dr. Goss on an extended auto trip through the cattle district and Dr. Goss took many blood samples back to his laboratory with him. The Doctor is convinced that this abortion is very contagious in cattle and it is hoped that he may report some remedy.




Benton Would Be a Human Dynamo in Congress.

### Care and Feeding of Infants.

So much has been written and said the last few years on the care and feeding of infants, that it seems everyone must be fairly well enlightened on the subject. The truth is, very few have as yet learned why babies have colic, or constipation, or many other preventable troubles which so often lead to more serious illness.

The care of infants should commence at the beginning of pregnancy. A mother to give her child health at birth must, herself, have health. Proper diet and exercise, with congenial surroundings are all that are necessary to accomplish this. Many mothers during pregnancy have abnormal cravings. It is not, as is popularly supposed, necessary to satisfy this craving, only to a limited degree. Many times to do so would be to injure the health of both mother and babe. This craving will not develop to any extent if proper food is taken. As a rule there is no milk the first few days after birth. Nature has provided for this; baby does not need anything but a little warm water every two hours until he is three or four days old. The water need not be given during the night.

Normally, milk should begin to be secreted in the mammary glands the third or fourth day, or sooner. The amount of milk at first is a source of great anxiety to many mothers. Now consider this; a small baby's stomach at birth, holds less than one ounce, the largest baby's stomach at birth not more than one and one-half ounces. Imagine a tiny bag no larger than the end of the thumb to the first joint. That is the size of the new born baby's stomach. So, ordinarily, we need not worry about the quantity. It is the quality about which we should think. This is obtained by the mother avoiding things which are injurious to herself as well as the milk; such as too much highly seasoned food, onions, cabbage, or anything that makes the milk distasteful, too rich, or too thin.

Infants should never be nursed often than every two hours. When six or eight weeks old every two and one-half hours. After four months every three hours. At no age should baby be fed between the hours of 10 P. M. and 6 A. M.

Often mothers have no system about feeding a child and nurse it every time it frets. This causes baby to develop an abnormal appetite and from force of habit the desire to nurse is almost constant.

Milk requires at least one and a half hours to digest, then the stomach needs a little time to rest before more milk is taken into it. When fresh milk is taken before the previous feeding has had time to digest it produces colic. The fresh milk mixing with the partly digested milk causes rapid formation of gas which in turn causes the severe cramps so painful to baby. Properly fed babies never have colic.

Not only does giving food too often cause stomach indigestion, vomiting, colic, but it also causes intestinal indigestion, constipation, diarrhea, and the various so-called summer complaints. This is because the food has not been properly digested in the stomach before entering the intestines, also too large a quantity has been taken.

Baby should never nurse more than twenty minutes' and only one breast at a feeding. Babies at all ages should be given water frequently during the day.

Beside the food no drink should be given baby, but water. Coffee and tea are very injurious to children of all ages. The average baby should not take any other food than milk before the seventh or eighth month. Then, very little and gradually increasing until baby is weaned, between the ninth and twelfth months.

This food should be mainly fresh, raw cow's milk, the rest soft food easily digested.

Space will not admit of enumeration of an explanation of how to administer food to a newly weaned child.

Children that are properly fed, are not fretful, do not catch cold easily, do not take contagious diseases easily, never have colic, constipation, or indigestion and will never have "summer complaint" or be sick while teething.
