

**SUMMER SCHOOL ENROLLMENT AT HAYS IS LARGE**

The summer term of the Fort Hays Kansas Normal School opened last week with an enrollment of 714 students which is the largest in the history of the school. The classes in all departments are well filled but President Lewis anticipated a heavy enrollment and provided extra faculty members in addition to the entire regular faculty.

To find rooms for so many students Miss Agnew, Dean of Women, and the Hays Chamber of Commerce had to make a thorough canvass of the city but rooms have been provided for all. The situation however, indicates that the state or some other agency must build dormitories or halls of residence before the rooming problem can be adequately met.

Over half the students are candidates for the One Year State Certificate. There are about 100 of those who want to teach, yet without positions.

**AMERICAN LEGION BULLETIN**

**Casper J. Middlekauff Post No. 173**

**The Greatest Union on Earth**

O'Brien, the head of a family of six, waived exemption because he believed others knew better than he where he could most be needed when the call came. He landed in class 1A and went without beefing or asking why. He was wounded three times and gassed, and after nine months in the hospital was discharged, the doctors advising outdoor work to stave off incipient tuberculosis.

In a canvass for new members, an American Legion worker called at his home. Neighbors who were caring for five children said that the mother was doing day work, and that O'Brien was starting his third week in search of any kind of a job he could hold down.

Stein, the American Legion Post Employment Officer, corraled him that night, and for five solid days, forgetting his own business and the drive for new recruits, trudged with him the streets of the city of brotherly love. Everywhere it was the same answer, "Too light for the job," softened, perhaps, with a smile or an "I wish we could, my boy."

Strangely, he was not too light for the job "Over There" he'd help finish, although when he came to the Post no tinge of bitterness or of rancor stamped his speech or manner. There remained only that last-ditch, "Let's go" spirit, that for nearly a month had driven one hundred and thirty pounds from door to door in search of work. They sent him to Mason, a member of The Legion and Captain of the Guards of one of Philadelphia's oldest industries, and Mason put him on the pay roll without asking why.

That is all, except that Stein, who neglected his business was a Jew, Mason was a Protestant, and the man they "saw through" was a Catholic without a membership card in the Legion. —Life, May 20, 1920.

**Maintaining Law and Order**

"The Executive Committee deplores the fact that several members of the American Legion in various places have used force and violence in attempting to stop actions which they considered disloyal. We ask instead that all Posts remember that our Constitution provides that we uphold law and order, and that all members should be informed that any actions which they consider to be disloyal should be communicated to the United States District Attorney of Kansas, Mr. Fred Robertson, Kansas City, Kansas, and should let him take such action as he sees fit. All members of the Legion should hereafter refrain from any and all acts of violence."

The highest ideal of The American Legion of SERVICE—service to our country and service to our comrades who need our help. In the service of our country, we will defend it from the foes without as well as from the foes within. In defending our country from the foes within, we are to take a determined stand for LAW AND ORDER. While representing 5,000,000 service men and women who have conclusively proven their loyalty and patriotism, we are ever mindful of the 100,000,000 other red-blooded American citizens, who remained at home and furnished the army behind the army, and without whom we could have accomplished but very little. There is no attempt on the part of The Legion to monopolize patriotism, even if such were possible. We realize that our service to our country will depend exactly upon that extent to which we are able to get the support and the approval of the one hundred million other American citizens. In our stand for the maintenance of law and order we realize that as good soldiers we obeyed the military authority, and now as good citizens, with even a keener sense of responsibility than ever before, we will obey civilian authority as it comes to us through the Constitution of the United States and is expressed in the National, State and Local Government.

**ORDINANCE NO. 876**

An ordinance to establish the term and fix the compensation of the City Attorney, City Clerk, City Treasurer, Police Judge, City Engineer, City Marshal and Fire Chief. And repealing ordinances number 292 317, 559, 702 and 708.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Commissioners of the City of Hays:

Section 1. That the city attorney, city clerk, city treasurer, police judge, city engineer, city marshal and fire chief and each of them shall hold their respective offices until their successors are appointed and qualified.

Section 2. That the city attorney shall receive for his services the sum of \$50.00 per month.

Section 3. That the city clerk shall receive for his services the sum of \$125.00 per month.

Section 4. That the city treasurer shall receive for his services the sum of \$15.00 per month.

Section 5. That the police judge shall receive for his services the sum of \$25.00 per month.

Section 6. That the city engineer shall receive for his services the sum of \$1.00 per month.

Section 7. That the city marshal shall receive for his services the sum of \$125.00 per month.

Section 8. That the fire chief shall receive for his services the sum of \$1.00 per month.

Section 9. That all fees collected by any city officers as provided by ordinance shall be paid to the treasurer monthly and receipt therefor filed with the city clerk.

Section 10. That ordinance number 292, ordinance 317, ordinance 559, ordinance 702, and ordinance 708 be and are hereby repealed. And all ordinances in conflict, or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith.

Section 11. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force 10 days from and after its first publication.

**ORDINANCE NO. 875**

An ordinance to amend Sections 1 and 2 of Article 1 of Ordinance No. 553 of the City of Hays, Kansas, and repealing said original sections.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Commissioners of the City of Hays, Kansas:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 1 of Ordinance 553 be amended so as to read as follows: Section 1. That there be and is hereby created a Board of Health for the City of Hays, Kansas. Said board to be chosen by the Commissioners and to consist of two of the said Commissioners. The said Board of Health shall appoint a physician who shall be ex-officio a member of said board of health and the secretary and

health officer for the same.

Section 2. That Section 2 of Article 1 of Ordinance number 553 of the City of Hays, Kansas, be amended so as to read as follows: Section 2. The said board of health shall supervise the health interests of the people of the City of Hays, Kansas, and is hereby authorized and empowered to make, adopt, publish and enforce such additional rules and regulations as may be necessary in their opinion, to make this ordinance effective and as the exigencies may demand. Said board shall meet quarterly, or oftener if deemed necessary on call of any one of its members. The members of said board shall receive no compensation other than their respective salaries as commissioners of the city; but the health officer and secretary of said board shall receive for his services the sum of \$25.00 monthly.

Section 3. That Sections 1 and 2 of Article 1 of Ordinance 553 be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force 10 days after its first publication.


