Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, will give personal aid in the campaign to check wage cuts in the textile mills of Georgia, Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina and Alabama.

Collection of approximately \$12,000,000 in delinquent and additional sales and miscellaneous taxes by the government as a result of a special drive ending September 3, was announced recently by Commissioner Blair.

Hery Curran, Coalitionist-Republican, now president of the borough of Manhattan, will be Mayor Hylan's opponent at the polls in New York next November. Curran won the Republican nomination in the primary, polling 31,084 more votes than the combined votes of his three rivals.

A demented man was arrested recently in St. Peter's cathedral in Rome, while insisting that he be admitted to the vatican. He said he had been invited to dine with the pope.

A general improvement in postal savings deposits throughout the country was shown by August reports, the postoffice department announces.

Fines collected under the Crabbe liquor enforcement act of Ohio, since it became operative on November 3, 1920, now total half a million dollars, half of which has gone to the counties in which collected and half to the state.

The Canadian board of railway commissioners has declined to order a general reduction in freight rates throughout the dominion. A minority of the board favored a reduction of ten per cent.

Quebec voted itself wet last week by an overwhelming majority.

One man was shot and two wounded in a sensational dash for liberty at the Joliet, Ill., penitentiary in which a Chicago gunman and a companion made their escape. Another convict was killed while attempting to scale the wall.

Boilermakers, blacksmiths, machinists, electrical workers and sheet metal workers employed by various railroads have voted to strike in protest to the wage reduction ordered by the U. S. railway labor board, two railroad representatives of the A. F. of L. report.

Inauguration of a permanent policy to combat unemployment throughout the country in future years is said to be one of the purposes of the administration in assembling in Washington a national conference of unemployment.

Membership of the League of Nations will be increased to fifty if the assembly adopts the recommendation of the political committee which has decided to approve the admission of Latvia and Estonia. Hungary's application will not come up until later.

Postmaster General Kellaway of Great Britain has just opened at Leaford, Oxfordshire, the first station in the imperial wireless chain which, when completed, will link up almost every part of the British empire.

Crown Prince George of Greece narrowly escaped capture by a band of mounted Turkish irregulars while en route to Brusa, Asia Minor, from the battle front.

Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain, is not expected to come to Washington to attend the arms conference. There are too many big domestic and international issues hanging fire at home to permit him taking the trip to the United States. It is likely A. J. Balfour will head the English delegation.

William Howard Taft, chief justice of the United States supreme court, on September 15, celebrated his 64th birthday anniversary by entertaining about 100 neighbors at his Summer residence at Murray Bay, Quebec, Canada.

Arrangements are being made to hold in Paris next Spring, an exhibition of all American art activity, including not only the fine arts, such as painting and sculpture, but also the arts as applied to industry and the decorative arts, such as furnishings and architecture.

The present period of "industrial stagnation" must not be permitted to stop the onward march in the fight of labor for improved conditions, Samuel Gompers said in an address to the national convention of street and electric employees.

Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain has been put under treatment of Lord Dawson, personal physician to the late King Edward, as he is suffering from chills and neuralgia, contracted while fishing in the rain.

Former Vice President Thomas R. Marshall received a great ovation at the Kingston, R. I., fair when he made a vigorous appeal for the people to get behind President Harding during the forthcoming armament conference in order that "we may ward off every enemy of mankind."

An offering of federal farm loan bonds will be made about October 1, Secretary Mellon says.

Collection of the September 15 installment of income and profits taxes are expected on the basis of preliminary reports to reach easily the estimated total of \$525,000,000, treasury officials report.

DO KIDS GET BY—?

Control Out of Date
"Do children show respect to parents and to old folks that children showed forty years ago?"

This question was asked of Rural Welfare by a mother who seemed to think that "too many kids are getting by on bad manners." She stated that there seemed to be a lack of respect for parents and lack of respect for old people by too many boys and girls.

This mother had travelled some, in fact she was in the public service which brought her in contact with folks where she could observe and study these questions and habits. She said that this failing was to be noticed in almost every community. If this be true, who is to bear the blame? Is it the parents or is the root of the trouble to be found in our schools? We have taken out of our schools the old fashioned books, in which every lesson printed, had something to say that would lead the child toward respect for parents and old people.

We have too many teachers who no longer have time to go to or be leaders in church, Sunday school or class meeting. Teachers in some places are not as particular of their habits as we used to expect a teacher to be.

It is a public disease if we are raising children who lack in respect to old folks and who do not know the lesson taught in that great motto, "Honor thy Father and thy Mother."

WHO PAYS THE BILL—

Who Fights the War
The men who make war do not enlist and do not fight the battles of war. That's the big reason why we have wars.

The men who want high cost roads do not have to pay for them. That's why we have roads costing outrageous prices.

It is amusing to see and hear some of the silk-hat and silk-sock city fellows giving the taxpayer and meal ticket grower advice on the road business.

These are the fellows who yell when the natives want to protect their own pocketbook. The political boss has had a taste of the honey in the road hog drive. He wants road building to go on no matter whether the taxpayer can pay the tax or not.

These chaps with six-dollar hats on six-cent heads want the governor of the state to order roads to be built at a cost of forty to ninety thousand dollars a mile, with at least half of this cost as a clear cut political rake-off.

If this litter of road hogs had to farm and sell oats at twenty cents a bushel to pay for these roads, road building graft would have stopped long ago.

In Ohio the people had to take up this fight and stop the raid and rape of the road dollar. No public officer would come to the rescue of the public or the taxpayer. The state highway department with brazen gall and

impudence went ahead promoting high cost roads until a cyclone hit it. Then it played the baby act by saying that the political boss made it be a dunce and wax stool pigeon. Any man who will take orders to go ahead and rob the public is not fit to hold any job in the public service.

Why make road hogs rich and the taxpayer poor? Why not eject public officials who will not take the bait offered to them by road hog agents? Why should any county be burdened with high cost roads because a county commissioner can have a free joy ride to California and return?

Why should we tolerate the road hog disease that robs our purse so that a favored few can have a booze-spreed at a leading hotel in the capital city? How long will it take the dunce taxpayer to see why he is having a lean harvest, high taxes while the road hog revels on easy street?

If men who make war had to fight the war, there would be no war. If those who want high cost roads had to work for wages to pay for such roads we would have no roads costing over \$20,000 per mile.

Indiana's governor has hit the road hogs hard. Illinois has a governor who has squeezed the graft out of high cost roads. The folks of Ohio ought to write letters and ask Ohio's governor to do the same thing. Do it now. Talk plain. The Governor of Ohio will answer any letter you write to him.


